Dick Barton

Maureen, Amanda and Jonathan would like to thank everybody who attended the funeral of Dick Barton at the church on the 2nd October and who added to the collection in aid of the memorial hall. Dick had lived in the village since the 1972 and will be sadly missed.

Parking in the Village

Alongside improvements to the A1, residents will have noticed that parking in our Village is increasingly becoming an issue. The line of sight has worsened when approaching Middleton Tyas from the A1, traffic coming from the Services has increased, and HGVs parking opposite the slip road leading to Morris Grange causes problems. An accident involving several vehicles happened on Wednesday 14th November and we feel that this was hardly a surprising event. Some three years ago, a survey was undertaken of residents living towards the end of the Village asking for their views on the implementation of double-yellow lines. In the light of the many changes, another has now been requested along with one for residents living along School Bank where parking creates hazardous driving conditions. We would like the 30mph temporary speed limit imposed during the roadworks made permanent rather than reverting to the original 40mph as is the current situation.

Speed Awareness

Moving along from the above, two daylight teams have now been formed in order to undertake speed checks in the Village. These checks will take place after our volunteers have been trained - this is imminent. Motorists will have 100m warning that these checks are taking place. You heard it here first!

Burglaries in the Village

In our peaceful Village, we saw two burglaries in the last month. This is an extraordinary occurrence and although the Police reassured us that crime is on the decrease more generally in Richmondshire, we certainly do need to be very vigilant here in Middleton Tyas. Anyone seeing anything suspicious or unusual, or seeing unexpected vehicles or individuals around the Village are encouraged to ring 101 and talk to the Police.

Parish Council Precept

The Parish Council recommended a small increase to our precept for the next financial year. This will mean that householders in the Village will see an increase of around £4 per annum in that portion of their Council Tax relating specifically the areas managed by the Parish Council. Without this increase, our budget for 2019/20 indicates that we would have a deficit of around £600 with very little contingency for unforeseen events. Clearly, this is not a sustainable position. Whilst we appreciate that any rise in Council Tax in unwelcome, we are committed to trying to maintain and improve the Village for everyone. We would particularly encourage residents wishing to discuss this further to attend the next Parish Council meeting which will now be at 7pm <u>on the 6th December</u> in the Memorial Hall. This date has been changed, so please note it carefully in your diaries.

Minutes of all our meetings (together with associated papers) are placed on the Village website once they have been approved by the Council - usually at the following meeting. We would like to encourage residents to come to our Parish Council meetings when they can. All Residents are welcome - we meet next on the 6th December at 7pm in the Memorial Hall.

A Christmas Tail, by a rectory canine.

I like to think that Christmas promotes love and inclusion. Christmas adverts portray family and encourage

generosity to those both near and far, loved and unknown, and rightly so. Christmas is after all the celebration of a human family and the birth of the Christian family. The connection between people is memory; it doesn't take long for someone to say. "Do you remember when...." And so, today I am going to tell you a great remembering of the canine clan, one which has been passed from snout to snout throughout the annals of hounds, ever to be remembered and embellished over the years....
