Kevin and Fran step up to the plate

Such a pity we don't have a Village Gala any more, isn't it? Such a pity nothing seems to be happening about the Diamond Jubilee, isn't it? Well thanks to Kevin and Fran Hacking at the Shoulder of Mutton, it looks as though it's all taking off.

Not content with just organising a party to celebrate the Queen's Diamond Jubilee next June, Kevin and Fran have plans to bring back the traditional Village Gala with all the old entertainments and some new ones too and to make this an annual event after a lapse of something like twenty years.

The plan is that the event will be held on the RDC field adjacent to the school (RDC permitting). It will go on over the Bank Holiday weekend 2/3 June 2012 and will include a football competition, cricket competition, quoits, a tug-of-war and, for the less athletic, traditional competitions like flower-arranging and cake-making. It's hoped that there will be a climbing wall provided by the Army and fun and games for the children. Perhaps even a mini-Crufts so that even the dogs have something to take part in!

In the evenings there will be live music and there will be an ice-cream stall, a beer tent and plenty of food throughout. The emphasis is on there being something for everyone to enjoy.

What Kevin and Fran need now are two things: people to help and sponsorship. Initially they want is about four or five people to help get the ball rolling. More people will be needed as plans are firmed up. If you have ideas about what you would like the event to include and want to be involved in getting it off the ground, give them a ring on 377271.

Although the venture is not profit-seeking it needs to make some money to carry forward so that the fair can become an annual event and quite a bit of money is needed up front to cover major items such as the hire of the marquee, a PA system and so on. YOUR VILLAGE NEEDS YOUR HELP!!! PLEASE READ ON.....

The lead article in last month's Village News made the strong case for fast, stable broadband in our villages. Thank you if you responded to express frustration with our current broadband, a frustration which seems to be shared equally by both business and social internet users.

Government and European money has been made available to pay for broadband upgrades in North Yorkshire over the next six years. **But, there is almost certainly not enough money to provide high speed broadband for everyone. For us to have a real chance of benefiting we need to demonstrate strong community support, which means at least 150 expressions of support.**

There are two easy ways to help. The first, which is vitally important, is to complete the 'Expression of Interest' form attached to this Village News and to encourage your friends and neighbours to do the same. Completed Expressions of Interest and supporting letters will become the basis of our case for funding so feel free to accompany your completed form with a letter describing your particular concerns and frustration with existing broadband.

The second thing to do is to visit www.northyorks.gov.uk/broadband and, click next to the box entitled "register your interest" and complete that questionnaire.

Finally, we will benefit from working with other local villages and we are doing that through the North Richmondshire Community Partnership which includes some 27 communities. In this way, we can strengthen our case for faster broadband which may be crucial to the future prosperity of our villages.

School report

Skipping Workshop

The whole school was involved in a workshop to learn the art and skills of skipping. The children worked in groups and were taught different skipping styles and tricks. 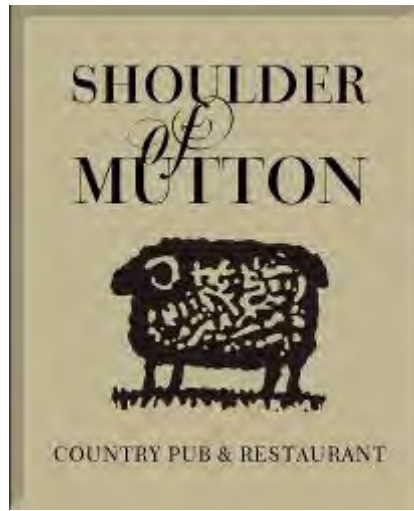

Letter from Canon Rachel Stowe

Autumn thoughts....

Being allotted the month of November is somehow appropriate, as I am now well into the autumn of my life and so now naturally see things from that perspective. As I write this I am looking out to warm sunshine and a beautiful blue sky. An hour ago it was raining heavily; during the night we experienced the tail-end of the latest hurricane. The flowers in the garden are having a colourful second showing but the leaves are turning quickly and falling off the trees.

Evidently the average age of worshipper in the Church of England is 61 and this is often reported with doom and gloom. But is this really such a disaster? To balance me to make this average there must be someone out there aged 44, in the prime of active life. Last night I went to the licensing of a Vicar in a large and dynamic parish in this diocese and discovered he is the same age as the youngest of my children, in effect July to my November. The church was packed with lots of young among the old. A real sign of hope for the future long after I and my fellow autumnal oldies have gone.

One thing about being elderly is being able to have the long view. I first became a PCC member 60 years ago, and have heard the same discussions again and again - about money and the parish share, the date of the Christmas fair and who will make the tea, the angst about the doings of the diocese, arguments about the forms of service, hymns, cleaning rota, and above all the lack of young people to share the load, 'there'll be no one left when we are gone' etc.etc.

And yet, somehow the dear old C of E seems to keep on passing on the mantle to the next generation and the next and so keep the light of Christ alive in town and village. The church in the Yorkshire village I was brought up in closed some thirty years ago and all seemed dead, but now services are about to start up again in the village hall and once again God will be publicly honoured within that community. Yes, a long winter but there are now real signs of new growth.

As we look around our villages it sometimes feels that figuratively speaking the leaves are falling off our trees in congregational terms, church roofs are leaking, parish shares not fully paid, numbers of worshippers at the traditional services falling. Sixty years ago I remember my Victorian-born ancestors saying much the same thing. This is to take the November perspective. But, look around, like the spring bulbs and seeds hidden in the November soil there is much to be hopeful about in this benefice. Café churches, innovative family services, children's and youth groups, confirmation candidates, increasing numbers at Bible study groups, the outreach through the shoebox appeals and other

charitable works, although hidden at times, are strong shoots.

So, take heart, enjoy November, for 'as long as the earth endures, seedtime and harvest, cold and heat, summer and winter, day and night, shall not cease'
