Parish Council Update Broadband

As this is written (Monday, 14 November), we have received 25 Broadband Expression of Interest forms from Middleton Tyas and three from Moulton. Thanks to all who have responded. Hopefully more forms are on the way for we do need more if we are to present a competitive case for an upgrade. If you have not completed a form please think about it now and consider the future importance of fast broadband to both you and the village – broadband speed already affects property demand and that impact will almost certainly increase as people use the internet more for work, study and leisure.

You might feel that a relatively slow service enables you to do what you want on the internet at the moment but is it reliable, can you

quickly deal with your e-mail, do large data files take ages to download/upload - can you e-mail photographs quickly to family and friends or are you left sitting around waiting while your computer does its best? Don't let concerns about cost put you off filling in a form; if you do not want to spend any more each month on broadband then say so on the form.

There is no guarantee that a wad of completed Expressions of Interest forms will bring us high speed/high quality broadband but our chances will be significantly less if we do not complete the forms. Christmas church service


Parents and members of the community are warmly invited to join us on Friday 16 December at 2.00 in the church to celebrate our Christmas service.

Jam Club

Well, that's another jam-making year finished. We have made 751 jars of produce in 2011 and will be starting again with marmalade in January. Our Christmas produce is already selling well, in fact, we have already sold out of Christmas Chutney but there are still jars of Apple and Plum Chutney, Pear and Lemon Chutney and Spicy

Beetroot Relish to cheer up Boxing Day cold meats. Not to mention Fruit Cheeses to serve with your cheese board, three different fruits in brandy syrup and Fruit Jellies to serve with meat (we're told that Apple Jelly with Rosemary goes down a treat in a pork sandwich). Last year Plum and Walnut Conserve with Brandy was very popular. It's already sold out this year but you might like to try Greengage Conserve with Almonds and White Rum - delicious spooned over voghurt or ice cream for an instant but guite special dessert. The Greengage Conserve and our Eliza Acton's Superlative Mincemeat are unique to the Village Shop so they make an interesting present for foodie friends.

Our last shot of the year will be Brandy Butter, which will be in the shop from 8 December onwards.

101 – Police non-emergency number

The police are looking at ways of making it easier for the public to contact their local police force. From 12 December communities across North Yorkshire will have access to 101, the national non-emergency telephone number for the police service in England and Wales. Our current non-emergency number 0845 60 60 24 7 will continue to be in place and will be gradually be phased out.

While 999 is a well-recognised number used to report emergencies, the 2010 British Crime Survey found that only 54% of the public know how to contact their local police if they want to talk to them about policing, crime or anti-social behaviour. The introduction of the 101 number will help communities to keep their neighbourhoods safe by giving them one easy way to contact their local police force to report non-emergency crime and disorder or to speak to their local officers.

The number is already in use in Wales, Hampshire and the Isle of Wight and Sheffield, and is now being rolled out across England on a phased basis. We know from the experience of these initial areas that 101 is well received by the public and has led to improvements in public satisfaction and confidence when calling the police. Further information can be obtained by visiting www.police.uk/101.

Calls to 101 will cost 15 pence per call, no

matter how long you are on the phone – this applies to both landlines and mobile phones. For the first time, everyone calling the police for nonemergency matters will know exactly how much the call will cost them and will be assured of equal

access whether they are on a pay-as-you-go mobile or a home landline.

In an emergency the public should continue to call 999, such as when a crime is in progress, when there is danger to life or when violence is being used or threatened.

Letter from Rev Geoff Spedding

We are entering a time of year – Advent – where there are rich messages for our consideration. That, inspired and uplifted by the season of Remembering, <u>we can work for change</u> just as our forbears did. Our carol "It came upon the midnight clear..." reflects on "2000 years of wrong" wrought by "man at war with man". Let that not be the last word. Let this be the century in which many of the wrongs of the past are overturned for good

Waiting in hope and expectation. We are NOT waiting for someone else (ie God or government) to bring about change, but ourselves involved in "see a need and fill it, spot a wrong and right it". Change is coming about, because we and our world need it, and because, thank God, some others have opened up possibilities, and paved a way for us to get involved. As we remember the saints of old, and "those who made the supreme sacrifice", we can be motivated out of our armchairs and into making peace work - locally or nationally or internationally. It has never been easier to volunteer, whether for charities in our region, or taking part in convoys to Romania or hospital building in Tanzania.

Finding that, in the darkness, there is light,

growth, renewal. This *is* the season of drab and dark days – of course it is. But even as the earth is cold and dark, we have only to lift a few inches of soil to discover spring bulbs growing root systems and their noses pushing toward the light (forgive the gardening cliché). Two thoughts:-That the greatest acts of love kindness and heroism often take place in the context of poverty, hunger, war, division. Someone – a child, a mother, a wounded soldier – gives their all for the other's sake.

That the most poignant thought around the Child in the Manger, is that he has come to die – for us and for our salvation. And in that we rejoice!

Advent is a season for preparation: I might put it a little differently – it's for so getting our heads around who Jesus was, and what Jesus came to do, that we enlist into action in His name, and in God's strength, that His will be done and the kingdom may come on earth as in heaven. **Geoff Spedding**
