News from the parish council *RDC Car Park*

North Yorkshire County Council has agreed to put white marker posts around the edge of both sides of the entrance to the car park in an attempt to prevent parents who drop their children off to go to the school from driving over the grass and spoiling it. We have also asked if NYCC can do the same on the opposite side of the road to stop cars being parked on the narrow strip of grass verge on Five Hills Lane at the entrance to East Hall stables.

High Speed Broadband

We have now collected some 40 Expression of Interest forms. Many thanks to those of you who have taken the short time needed to complete a form. The completed forms received describe a great deal of frustration with broadband speeds and there appear to be two main groups affected: 'Social' users feel they waste a lot of time waiting for their computer to respond and business users find it difficult to conduct their business from home. Less from more

Will you help?

We are the nucleus of a small group given the go-ahead, at a meeting of shareholders of the Village Shop on December 9, to come up with proposals for the operation and management of the village shop from Spring 2012, when the current management team plans to stand down. We are going to report back to shareholders in three months' time.

The shop has been heroically run for some time by a volunteer management team of three, two part-time paid staff, and a very small number of volunteer helpers. Our view is that this imposes unrealistic demands on everyone involved, and the successful long-term future of the shop depends on a much greater engagement with the shop by many more members of the community, contributing as, when and how they feel able.

A major target is to establish a pool of volunteers willing to serve behind the counter in two-hour blocks of time on a planned rota basis. Support for Saturday mornings and Wednesday afternoons is the paramount need but as, understandably, people are not going to rush to give up the whole of their Saturday mornings every week, we hope that by asking **less from more** people we can meet this need.

If you feel that working behind the counter is not for you, there are plenty of behind the scenes jobs on the admin and stock handling side, among others, where help would be very welcome. What we want is lots of people joining in for short periods and having some fun while they're doing it.

Picture this: this is one way we can see it working

A pair of friends arrange their rota so they are both working together for their two hour slot this week. One of them is on the till, the other is a pretty mean sandwich maker and in between times will give some shelves a clean and put out that new line in biscuits where people will see them. It's a chance to catch up with each other and they both enjoy chatting with the customers coming in and out.

Outside, a couple of people from the promotions group are lining up on the wall the entries for the best-decorated wellie. It's National Wellie Week and the competition has been a bit of fun when people come in the shop. Next week another group are offering all customers a mini-cream tea when they come in the shop in the afternoons. It's part of the promotion for local strawberries that's next week's special.

We know that there is a tremendous amount of experience, know-how and useful knowledge in this community, which the shop would benefit from tapping into. Obviously we are looking for at least two more people to join a prospective management team but more than that, we are looking for people who will work with us on specific limited projects without necessarily taking a role in the on-going management of the shop. For example, one such small group of people is already looking at how to replace the shop's ageing computer system.

We can't do anything about the fact that the shop itself is small and the immediate community it serves is small. For a secure future in difficult times, the shop needs to be able to punch above its weight by developing the business in new ways.

If you have experience in any aspect of business development, marketing, promotion or retailing and would be willing to join a small task group on addressing specific issues as they emerge, we would love to hear from you.

Similarly, if you would be willing to help in the running of the shop, either in the back room or in the shop itself, in any way at all, for as much or as little time as you like, do please give one of us a ring.

Letter from Rev David Lewis 1812 and 2012:

One of the most dramatic pieces of music in the classical repertoire must be Tchaikovsky's overture 'The Year 1812. It was commissioned in 1880 for the consecration of the Cathedral of Christ the Redeemer, which had been built in Moscow to commemorate the defeat of Napoleon in 1812. Clearly the public would expect something powerfully patriotic, and Tchaikovsky was not going to disappoint them. He intended the first performance to be in the large square outside the cathedral, with a huge orchestra supplemented by real artillery firing in the background.

The result was certainly loud enough. In fact the 1812 begins quietly, with a sombre traditional hymntune depicting the peaceful Russians waiting for the advance of the enormous French army. Then the music grows restless: Napoleon's power is proclaimed by horns and trumpets before a Russian folk dance begins to encourage the peasants. The Battle of Borodino has the *Marseillaise* competing against the Russian music as percussion instruments clash with each other. Napoleon reaches Moscow but is then forced to withdraw, and the opening hymn-tune returns, (reinforced at the original performance by the bells of the Cathedral). This leads to the victorious climax – the Russian National Anthem complete with cannon!

And what of Napoleon? Sometimes life throws up characters that are arrogant, pretentious or overbearing. Most of us instinctively like to see such people cut down to size. Napoleon invaded Russia with an army of half-a-million men. He came back a few months later with barely 20,000. Today 'Napoleon's retreat from Moscow' is synonymous with disaster and humiliation on a grand scale.

So that was the Year 1812. What about the Year 2012? It's impossible to predict the future, though we can be pretty confident that we are going to hear an almighty amount of fuss about the Olympic Games this year. And as far as our local churches go it is clear that there will be a lot of hard work: we have got at least three dozen weddings booked in the East Richmond benefice during 2012 plus a Confirmation Service with 19 candidates.

In January the post of Team Rector will be advertised nationally, with the hope that interviews can take place early in March. So there might be a new incumbent in place by the late summer or the autumn. But nothing is certain and there are no guarantees - just ask Napoleon about that! David Lewis
