News from the parish council Council Tax

The 0.4% increase in the Council Tax for 2012-13 is an adjustment of a decimal point because of the number of properties in the village RDC.collects the tax from, which varies from one year to the next.

There is no actual increase in the precept, as has been the case for many years.

Best kept village

Temporary Road Closure of Kneeton Lane

Jacobs will be installing a conveyor belt underneath the road between Middleton Lodge and Barton Quarry. We are advised by NYCC that this work will now take place between 31 March and 15 April 2012. The closure will affect the stretch of road from the main entrance gates of Middleton Lodge to the T-junction with the Barton Road. We understand there will be pedestrian access and some resident vehicular access during the works. Any further information will be posted on village notice boards.

Four kissing gates were requested and a plan was drawn up by John Vickers.

Following helpful discussions between Adrian Speir, Peter Penny and Andy Brown (both of NYCC Public Rights of Way Dept.) funding was obtained to facilitate the installation of thirteen new kissing gates to add to the four already installed by Adrian and Ralph. This will enable a number of circular walks around the village to be more accessible. Letter from Rev David Lewis *Jerusalem*

Every few days I travel into Northallerton to do my shopping. Driving home up the A167 it is always a joy to come around the bend at Salutation Farm. In the distance, a mile away on the next ridge, you can see Great Smeaton shining in the sunlight – a place of dreams – the city set on the hill – the New Jerusalem. Well, maybe not quite. Or not quite yet. But what of the Old Jerusalem?

I have just finished reading Simon Sebag Montefiore's acclaimed book called 'Jerusalem – The Biography'. This magnificent work traces the history of the place from earliest times up to the present day, and tries to tell the story in an evenhanded way that is fair to Jews, Christians and Muslims. On the whole the book is very readable, with helpful photos and maps. There are plenty of colourful characters and lots of significant events, for as the author says "the history of Jerusalem is the history of the world."

I must admit that at some points I got confused by the complicated names, and struggled to remember who was related to whom. Also, at times, the sheer amount of violence becomes sickening, as the reader is treated to yet another siege, massacre or atrocity. It is a fascinating history but also a very sad one in some respects. One example would be the Crusades – for many of us in the West these are perceived as a distant medieval thing that belong to a bygone era, but for many people in the Middle East the memories remain fresh and the Crusades might as well have happened last week.

Of course the current (seemingly insoluble) problems of the Holy Land are, at least in part, the fault of the British. During the First World War the Turkish Ottoman Empire was crumbling. The British government issued the Balfour Declaration promising Palestine to the Jews, at the same time that Lawrence of Arabia was promising it to the Arabs. It is pretty obvious, especially with hindsight, that this was a recipe for trouble in the future.

From a Christian perspective the most significant site in the city is the Church of the Holy Sepulchre, built over Christ's empty tomb. Sadly even this place has provided a focal-point for tension and trouble. The building is divided between six different denominations, and since the Middle Ages the keys of the church have been entrusted to a local Muslim family in an attempt to keep the peace between the rival factions. It has also been the scene of tragic stampedes during the annual Easter ceremony of the lighting of the holy fire.

So it all adds up to a very messy history. And it was into this mess that Jesus chose to come. "And when he drew near and saw the city he wept over it, saying, 'Would that even today you knew the things that make for peace!' (Luke 19 v 41-42).
