Church News

Letter from Rev Lynn Thorius 'We've never had it so good'

Well the Olympics have come and gone. Most of us would agree that the last two months have been quite extraordinary. The Queen's Diamond Jubilee, the Olympics and my ordination to the priesthood on 2 July in St Peter's, Church, Croft. Many of you shared this wonderful event with me for which I thank you all. To those who were not able to be with us in St Peter's Church, I thank you all for your prayers, goodwill messages and support.

To say that ministry is changing fast is perhaps not a statement one would attribute to the Church of England. However, in many ways it has changed and to some the church of today is hardly recognisable as the church in which they began their spiritual life. For some it is a source of bewilderment and even disillusion; and for some it is a source of stimulus and challenge. Adapting to a 'mixed economy church' of both inherited models and fresh expressions is not easy and change has never come to pass without tensions and challenges major and minor for all of us and not least the Priest. And for a new Priest trying to grapple with it all and learn from my experienced colleagues in the team is both stimulating and challenging.

In his lively book 'The Life and Work of a Priest' John Pritchard maps out three things that we need to be concerned about. One, the glory of God.; two, the pain of the world and three, the renewal of the church. From these flow distinctive roles of us all. One, Spiritual explorer; two, multi-lingual interpreter; three, wounded companion; four, friendly irritant; five, creative leader; and six, mature risk-taker. Some job description.

However, if we take just one of these roles, 'the pain of the world', we know that there are other extraordinary issues that cut across our world view such as the conflict in Syria or the fact that one year on after the famine was declared in the Horn of Africa, more than nine million people are still in need of humanitarian assistance. However, alongside the frustrations of persistent global inequalities, quiet initiatives have been sweeping through the poorest regions of the world, bringing new confidence and change. I believe that this is also happening in our churches today.

Many of us may not have heard of the 'Happy Planet Index', bringing the good news that "people in the UK are better off than others in the European Union or G8 countries, based on the perceived level of happiness, life expectancy and environment factors". *(Church Times 27/07/2012, Clair Bryden).* So there we have it, its official 'we've never had it so good' according to the 'Happy Planet Index'.
