Two cheers for democracy

I started off thinking the Village News would do its bit and bring you up-to-date information about the forthcoming election (November 15) for the new role of Police and Crime Commissioner in this regional police area. Then I found out how little effort is being put into giving the electorate the information it is entitled to which struck me as shameful, contemptuous of the electorate and a very dangerous precedent. Forgive me if you feel I am on a rant: I just feel this needs saying.

The role of the Police and Crime Commissioner will include:

- Meeting the public regularly to listen to their views on policing
- Producing a police and crime plan setting out local policing priorities
- Deciding how the budget will be spent
- Appointing Chief Constables and dismissing them if needed.

I'm not proposing to argue whether or not this is 'a good thing', merely to put forward the view that, if we are being given this choice, then the conduct of this election should be up to national standards (pretty high standards by any global measure) of any other democratic and non-discriminatory election.

At the time of writing this (22 October) it is not possible to find out who is standing for election in this police force area nor what they propose to bring to the office. That information will be available on the website <u>www.choosemypcc.org.uk</u> from 26 October. Alternatively you can ring 0800 1 07 07 08 and order printed information about our candidates. I got through on the third attempt having twice been told that the network was very busy and to try later. In other words, if you want to vote, you have to make a positive and prolonged effort to find out the information you need to make an informed choice. I don't recall ever having been in this position when it came to electing MPs or councillors.

In the 21st century making the information available on the web seems an obvious thing to do but internet access is still far from being available to every voter. As for having to ring up to actively order printed information about our candidates.... Come on! Our role in the democratic process is simply to think about the choices and vote accordingly, not to have to go on an information search first. (Continues on page 5)

Neighbourhood Watch

An account of two particularly nasty crimes being perpetrated in other parts of the country, particularly in rural areas, so beware!

The first is that gangs are putting a child's car seat at the side of the road with a fake baby in it ie a large doll or a blanket bundled up to look like a baby to a passing motorist. This is particularly likely to happen in wooded or rural areas. Drivers who stop to investigate, particularly likely to be women, are attacked and robbed.

Police advice is on no account to stop or even slow down but to report the incident to the police on 999 once at a safe distance.

The other scam is to throw eggs at the windscreens of passing cars at night. If the driver stops to clean the windscreen they are likely to be attacked. Turning on the windscreen wipers or, worse still, using the windscreen washers in an attempt to clear it can be equally dangerous as the mix of egg and water produces a cloudy liquid which almost totally obscures the windscreen, forcing the driver to pull over and stop, making him or her immediately vulnerable to attack.

These reports have come via Victim Support in Humberside and there is no suggestion that these incidents have happened locally but forewarned is forearmed.

Pedlar's Certificate

Anybody who comes to your door selling goods should have an official Pedlar's Certificate and

the police strongly urge that you should ask to see this before you even consider buying anything from them. If they do not have it with them they are committing an offence and you should have no dealings with them. If they are abusive or you feel in any way threatened don't hesitate to contact the police who are keen to deter any un-certificated traders from coming to our area.

Somewhere, the political advantages of a very low turn out have already been factored in and efforts are being made to ensure that the turn-out <u>is</u> low.. We cannot be so poverty-stricken that it is no longer possible to give the whole electorate the timely information to which it is entitled.

Letter from Canon Rachel Stowe What really matters

Yesterday my nine-year-old granddaughter was constructing a wordsearch about 'Christmas'. One of her sisters suggested 'Jesus' as a possible word but she said "No". I asked her why, saying (naturally!) that Jesus is who and what Christmas is really all about. "But Jesus isn't exciting" she replied, and this linked in with something which seems to be very much in the air around us at the moment. What *really* matters?

I take my cue from the opening of East Cowton's splendid 'Big Fish, Little Fish' liturgy.

We are not once a week friends – we are the family of God.

We are not a cosy club – we are the Body of Christ.

We are not just strangers meeting – we are the temples of the Holy Spirit

We are not here by accident – our Father has called us to worship

We are not just filling up an hour – Jesus wants us to know him better

We are not just going through the motions – the Holy Spirit has some special words for us So come; draw near to our God – and our God will draw near to us.

Deep in our hearts we know that the first priority for the Christian church is not just the people – it is Jesus, son of God whose Holy Spirit is always with us. The church exists because of him and for him, and its buildings are built for his worship and its clergy trained in theology, not social work. Yes, there may be community spin-offs in the church's numerous activities and concerns which are fulfilling, comforting positive and good but they are nonetheless secondary, reflecting Jesus's second great commandment to love our neighbours as ourselves. We are richly blessed in our villages with so many who do just that.

But the first great commandment, as Jesus makes plain, is to self-give in loving the Lord our God with all (not just a bit!) of our being, and that is not an easy option. But, as a front runner for the Archbishopric of Canterbury said recently and others have picked up on, what and who really matters is Jesus. So great credit to those of our PCC's who have recognised this and are taking a deep breath in supporting, alongside their Methodist colleagues, a local youth and schools worker to have an important part in the task of sharing the excitement of Jesus to our young people. So, remembering that it was said that Christianity only survived in communist Russia thanks to the Babouskas, the grannies, I must have further conversations with my granddaughter, because what really matters to us is that we are the family of God, the Body of Christ, temples of the Holy Spirit. As St James said in his Epistle - draw near to our God, and our God will draw near to us. Love and every blessing to you all. *Rachel*
