The Summer Season

Summer has already kicked off with the successful Plant Fair in Moulton in May. This month sees the celebration of the Queen's Coronation sixty years ago with a tea and afternoon of reminiscence and music (and lots of tea and cake, of course), in the Memorial Hall and a celebratory service at St Michael's Church at 9.30. Both events are on Sunday 2 June.

Then 'We can Dance', which is practically a home-grown charity, has a full calendar of events. The most glamorous event this month is an Ascot Ladies Day with afternoon tea, bubbles, a flutter on the horses at Crathorne Hall on 20 June. Sorry chaps, you're not really in on this one but you would be very welcome to a Quiz Night a few days later at the Shoulder of Mutton. Optimistically, there is also a Summer Luncheon planned for 23 September. Details are inside so you'll need your diaries for this issue.

The pinnacle of our summer season is the Open Gardens Afternoon on Sunday 6 July, 2.00 - 6.00. The proceeds are in aid of St Michael's Church funds.

Judging takes place during the first two weeks of next month but that means that the hard work has to be done during June!


Moulton Neighbourhood Watch

Letter from Venerable Simon Golding

I am writing this article on Ascension Day, the 40th day after Easter that commemorates the ascension of Jesus into heaven. During the forty-day period before he ascended into heaven Jesus preached and intermingled with his apostles and disciples. Ascension Day is in danger of being seen as the Cinderella Festival of the Church. In fact it is one of the four major festivals. In precedence it comes after Christmas and Easter and out-ranks the fourth, Pentecost.

The imagery and symbolism of the Ascension give an air of unreality and myth to the Festival. In an age when people accepted the model of a threedecker universe, Heaven, Earth and Hell, without question the concept of Ascension had a literal interpretation. The traditional interpretation conveys an understanding of 'Time Travel' or of being 'Transported into another dimension'. For ten days we are invited to wait in expectation for the gift of the Holy Spirit at Pentecost that fell on 19 of May this year. For Christians this is a time of reflection and thanksgiving, of expectation and waiting knowing that we are not alone, left comfortless, God keeps his promise.

One of the most memorable Country Ballads from the 1960's was the song 'I believe' performed by the Irish group, the Bachelors.

"I believe for every drop of rain that falls a flower grows

I believe that somewhere in the darkest night a candle glows

I believe for everyone who goes astray someone will come to show the way I believe, I believe

I believe above the storm the smallest prayer will still be heard

I believe that someone in the great somewhere hears every word

Every time I hear a newborn baby cry or touch a leaf or see the sky

Then I know why I believe"

The statement "I believe" is both a declaration and a pledge of faith. Belief and faith are deeply personal.

The famous quotation from the Letter to the Hebrews "Now faith is the assurance of things hoped for, the evidence of things not seen" is a standard text in approaching this most complex subject. As many of you reading this article will have as many experiences of faith and belief and the key to the Christian faith is a corporate sharing of the 'Good News' that Jesus presents to all who believe and trust in him. The song I have quoted can probably be defined as pantheistic, God in everything and everything in God, a broad-brush statement rather than a declaration of a specific belief or doctrine.

Sadly for some people their faith and knowledge has never developed and probably has more in common with Father Christmas or the tooth fairy than in a relationship with God. Making a personal declaration of faith can be likened to signing a cheque or using a pin number or remembering when you learned to swim, trusting and believing that when you let go of the side you wouldn't drown!

Faith is saying something and meaning it. Staking your life on what really matters and standing by that declaration. I recently read this graphic description of what faith really means. There was a man who entertained the crowds by pushing a wheelbarrow across a high wire, over a deep abyss. He asked the crowd "Do you think I can do this?" and they all shouted "Yes we believe you can do it! "OK", said the wire walker. "So who is going to get into the wheelbarrow?" To paraphrase the words of President John Kennedy "Not what we can do for God, but what God has done for us".

May you know the power of God's Holy Spirit in your lives!
