## It could be worse!

But at least you don't have to take your own coal! If you think your working conditions are miserable, read on. These are some of the Office Rules preserved from an unknown business by the Scottish Museum of Wool Textiles, Walkerburn. Thanks to Joan Stenson for passing this on.

- 1. Godliness, Cleanliness and Punctuality are the necessities of a good business.
- 2. This firm has reduced the hours of works and the clerical staff now only have to be present between the hours of 7am and 6pm on weekdays.

- 7. Members of the Clerical Staff will provide their own pens. A new sharpener is available, on application to Mr. Rogers.
- 8. Mr Rogers will nominate a Senior Clerk to be responsible for the cleanliness of the the Main Office and the Private Office and Boys and Juniors will report to him 40 minutes before Morning Prayers and will remain after closing hours for similar work. Brushes, brooms, scrubbers and soap are provided by the owners.

#### News from the parish council Crime

There have been several incidents of diesel being stolen from vehicles parked in the laybys around Scotch Corner. #### Parking

#### Re-cycling

#### Dog fouling

#### Street lighting

North Yorkshire County Council is consulting on some streetlights being switched off from midnight to 5am in order to save money and reduce carbon emissions. None of the lights on the main streets will be affected for road safety reasons and there are other exclusion criteria. #### **Overgrowing branches**

It this is not done then the council will be asked to carry out the work and the bill will be sent to the property owner.

On this occasion it was only (only!) personal information which was being asked for but the person called did exactly the right thing. Do not divulge any personal information and end the conversation immediately.

#### Who is coming and going

Grace Caldwell has been appointed to Village Seeds Project as our children's and youth worker. The appointment has been funded for three years with Grace working thirty hours per week. The funding is jointly from some of the team parishes but also from the Methodist and Anglican Churches in Hurworth.

No applications were received from the recent advertisement for a priest for the new benefice of Barton, Cleasby, Croft, Eryholme, Manfield and Middleton Tyas with Moulton. When the post is filled the intention is that he/she will at the Vicarage in Middleton Tyas. The Vicarage in Barton will be sold.

Bishop John will retire in January with Bishop James taking on a 'caretaker' role until Easter. He will then become our area Bishop.

#### Letter from Grace Cauldwell

I spent this morning at a school harvest festival, having dashed gratefully in from the cold and wind outside! It reminded me just how close to winter we are - there may even have been snow by the time you read this, and you will likely be preparing for bonfire night, with all its fireworks and fun. And yet it's also bulb planting time, tucking them up before the ground freezes, so that in the early spring we will have gardens full of colour.

Having arrived into the villages seed project in September, the first month has felt a bit like planting bulbs..... A lot of digging to find out what's beneath the surface, then carefully starting to plant. Working out what will go where, hoping that these small, sometimes bland seeming things - an assembly here, a conversation there - will blossom into mighty trees that will bear fruit for God's Kingdom. When you ask me what I've done this month, I've visited schools, I've run activities, I've started a lunch club, I'm setting up a toddler group in Barton, none of it is spectacular 'fireworks' activities but, like bulbs planted deep in good soil, we pray these things will begin to grow deep roots into our communities, the presence of God infiltrating every area of our villages, so that come Harvest Time we have a wonderful crop of people making steps on their journey of faith. Please pray that this work will grow, and develop, and pray about how you could be practically involved in this work, maybe through helping out at a messy church, or making tea at the toddler group?
