Middleton Tyas Community Shop Questionnaire – analysis of results

- The Middleton Tyas Community Shop Committee distributed a questionnaire in January aimed at determining residents' views on the use of the shop, and to canvass for ideas on improving the service it offers. So thanks go to those who returned the questionnaires. We distributed over 250 questionnaires and received 32 completed forms – a disappointing result. The returns we received where largely from shop enthusiasts, most of whom are already acting as volunteers or supporting the shop through donations and fund raising.
- Every return indicated that the shop was either very important or important with 60% stating they use the shop daily and the balance weekly. In terms of shop opening hours, 90% use the shop from Monday to Friday, and 60% use it on Saturday. The most popular shopping time is from 0800-1400 with only 20% stating they use the shop between 1400 and 1730.
- As we might expect in a rural village, virtually everyone uses the car for weekly supermarket shopping, and the Community Shop is largely used as a convenience store. A growing number of people now use on line shopping for their weekly groceries. Most returns indicated that customers were happy with the services and stock the shop offers. A few felt that products were too expensive, but most people recognize that a community shop cannot compete with supermarkets on price and level of stocks.
- 4. We very much appreciate the offers of help contained in a number of returns, and all who volunteered have already been contacted to take their assistance forward. However, we currently do not have enough volunteers to help run the shop effectively, and I would like to reiterate the appeal made in the questionnaire for more volunteers to come forward to help out so that we can maintain the required level of service and opening times. Additionally, we urgently need

someone to fill the vacancy on the Management Committee as Secretary.

- 5. The Management Committee has examined all ideas put forward in the returns, and will take forward all those that are feasible. Unfortunately, in some cases, good ideas cannot be followed through for staffing, space, security, or legal reasons.
- 6. Thank you for your support of our community shop.
