CFR are a group of local volunteers, who in their spare time, using their own vehicles, help save lives in their local community. Trained by the Yorkshire Ambulance Service (YAS) in Basic Life Support (BLS) skills including resuscitation and automated external defibrillator and oxygen therapy, the volunteers attend 999 calls to anyone over the age of eight years old in their local community. Living within a five mile radius, a CFR can attend within minutes and begin life support before Rapid Response and paramedics arrive. In cases such as cardiac arrest, stroke or asthma attacks, time is of the essence and being able to attend and give that BLS as soon as possible is saving the lives of our more rural and remote areas of the community.

Local group co-ordinator, Nadine Short explains how she came to be involved: "I wasn't even aware of CFR though the Melsonby and Stanwick team, of which I am now a member, has been in operation for 5 years. It was only through my local GP surgery when the YAS began a recruitment campaign last year was I made aware. I feel this is something that should be publicised, not only as a reassurance to the local community, but also as a way of continuing our recruitment drive. There can never be too many CFR's, the more we have, the wider the area we can serve and the more lives can be saved. "As volunteers we rely on fundraising and are looking to raise money for uniforms, training equipment and technology. We are also looking for possible sponsorship."

Letter from Rev David Lewis One percent of history

1 July is the 25th anniversary of my ordination as a priest in the Church of England. I recall that prior to the service at Birmingham Cathedral we all had to spend several days on an Ordination Retreat in a large house out in Worcestershire. It was unclear whether we were allowed to watch any television during the Retreat but on 1 July 1989 the British Lions were due to play Australia in Sydney. So on the day of my ordination I crept downstairs in the early hours and switched on the TV with the sound right down. The Lions lost badly, by 30 points to 12.

Twenty-Five years is quite a long time. Indeed it is more than 1% of the entire history of the Christian Church! And in 1989 the world was a

different place. Personal computers had barely been invented. Mobile phones were the stuff of science fiction. My local Deanery (which was Coleshill, on the eastern edge of Birmingham) had about two dozen vicars in it. and most of them were in charge of a single church in a single parish. And, of course, they were all men. There were no women priests in those days, let alone women bishops. Gay clergy were known to exist, but we believed they were confined to the dioceses of London and Chichester.

Society has changed immeasurably since then. I suppose that the most obvious single difference is the rise of the internet and its assosciated technology, including digital TV, smartphones, superfast broadband, social media and so on. Attitudes have changed too not least with the growth of a litigation culture. And a celebrity culture. And an allpervasive consumer culture: these days it seems students in college and even patients in hospital are seen as 'consumers'.

It is difficult to make any sense of all these social and cultural changes whilst you are living through them. (And I reckon things have changed quite a lot during the ten years I have served in my current post - never mind over 25 years). All these changes have an impact on the Church's life. Where will the Church be 25 years from now? God knows: I certainly don't.

However, on the other side of the equation we can say that some things do not change. And, to quote from the Ordination service, the Church is called 'to proclaim the faith afresh in each generation'. In any period of history the Church's basic task is to worship God and to make disciples for Christ. All the rest of its activity is peripheral to that fundamental calling. David Lewis

a-brac, book stalls, scones and donations. Your help is greatly appreciated.


