News from the parish council Parking near Moto Services

Towards the end of October a small group of residents from the top of the village will meet with councillors, County Highways and the police to discuss what can be done about the serious problem of illegal parking on the road close to Moto Services. It is something we have been trying to address for a long time but seems to get worse every year.

Overhanging branches

There are still branches and foliage overhanging on to the footpaths and roads causing a hazard to pedestrians and road-users in some parts of the village. If these are not cut back to the property boundary the council will do the work and the cost will have to be met by the property owner.

Brambles near Scotch Corner

The brambles on the grass verge near Scotch Corner which have been causing concern to local residents have been cut back and the land tided up by Euro Garages, the new owners of the petrol station. They have told us they will have an annual maintenance programme in place so the problem should not happen again.

Putting something back into the community

Do you feel you would like to put something back into our village community? Or, perhaps you have recently moved here and would like to get to know people and do something worthwhile locally? Or, maybe you want learn some new skills and beef up your CV?

As long as you are 18 or over and are on the electoral roll you are eligible to become a parish councillor. At present, we need one more councillor but we are hopeful that in the next few months the rules will become more flexible so that we can increase the number.

You need to live or work in the parish and be able to commit one evening a month to attend meetings and, between meetings, be involved in the workings of the council. The Parish Council is friendly and supportive and meetings are definitely un-stuffy. (We also try to keep them as short as we can and it is rare for them to last much more than an hour). We often have to work with other agencies, such as the District and County councils, the Police, the Highways Department and so on – we have all learned a lot about how local government works.

Some of the things the parish council has been involved in recently are:

- making the case for and securing high speed broadband in the village
- promoting flood prevention measures
- securing a local access road as part of the A1 upgrade, thus ensuring that traffic is not diverted through the centre of the village whenever the motorway has to be closed

Major issues coming up in which the parish council will represent the interests of the village are:

- The proposed development of housing north of Kneeton Park
- The proposed development of a retail centre south-west of Scotch Corner

Whether you are still at school, working or retired with years of professional and life experience behind you we would be delighted to hear from you. In the first instance you may like to have an informal chat with the Parish Clerk or any of the parish councillors - our contact details are displayed on every parish notice board. We very much look forward to hearing from you.

Ofsted
