

Richmondshire District Council would like to invite all residents to contribute to local development guidance for Middleton Tyas. The Council has gathered together a lot of information about the village including its local context, history, local services and infrastructure. This information is useful in helping us to update the village development limit. But it would help us to run this information past as many people as possible so that we can fully understand local conditions. We have put together this material in to a report together with maps of local important features. These are available to download from the planning page on the Council's website www.richmondshire.gov.uk/planning. You will be able to send us your comments by email or by post using the contacts on this page. A drop-in session will also be held in Middleton Tyas, where you can meet with officers from the Council's Community Development Team. Council Leader Cllr John Blackie will host a question and answer session about local development issues and national planning policies at the end of this session. We are aiming to hold this event in the last week of January 2015 and will publicise time and place in the New Year.
