The WIDE way to protect your home

Sir Bernard Hogan-Howe, the Metropolitan Police Commissioner, has recently been in the national news promoting the use of CCTV cameras by householders. He commented that police forces need crime scene footage, and that cameras at eye level are often more helpful than overhead cameras in identifying offenders. This has raised concerns in some quarters about privacy issues and the use of facial recognition technology.

It stands to reason that once a crime has been committed, clear CCTV footage can be very useful in helping to identify the offender. However, it is obviously preferable to stop the crime being committed in the first place, and this is where Neighbourhood Watch and Home Watch comes into its own. The 2008 Campbell Systematic Review of the Effectiveness of Neighbourhood Watch shows it as effective in 26% of cases. It's not just about reporting when you've seen something suspicious, but about creating the kind of strong communities where crime is less likely to happen in the first place, and providing people with the most up-to-date advice to help them deter criminals and protect their homes.

So what is the best way to guard against being burgled? As well as a Neighbourhood Watch scheme, which Middleton Tyas already has, you can make sure your home has WIDE which stands for:

W - Window locks

- I Interior lights and timer
- D Double or deadlocks
- E External lights on sensor

The British Crime Survey (now the Crime Survey for England & Wales) from 1992 - 2012 puts forward the 'WIDE principle' as being the most effective way of reducing burglaries. Used together these measures offer 49 times more burglary protection than if you have no security measures at all. So, whatever your feelings about CCTV outside your home, there is still a lot you can do to keep it safe. *Information provided by North Yorkshire Police*

School report

Easter holiday

The school will be closed from 27 March to 13 April.

Active Kids vouchers

Outdoor classroom and performance area

The school recently celebrated the launch of its wooden outdoor classroom and performance area. The build was made possible by the school PTA who had raised a staggering £20,000 in only two years (2011 - 2014). A further grant from Moto Scotch Corner Services funded the purchase of a story chair, wooden carved mushrooms and wooden benches. In addition the fortnightly quiz nights at the Black Bull have funded six interpretative educational panels.

Next steps

The governing body has sent a letter to all stakeholders outlining the next steps of the proposal to form a two-site federated school. This can be viewed on both school websites. There will be a 'frequently asked questions' document on both websites in due course and the governing body welcomes views from all stakeholders during this process.


Shades of Shimla
