Nearly Christmas already? How has that happened? We're only just beginning to get used to cold weather! However, it's really happening and it's time to look forward to all the traditional events that mark the village calendar, especially at this time of year.

On Saturday 5 December there will be the Festive Supper at the Memorial Hall. This isn't a fundraiser: it's just an opportunity to come and enjoy a glass of wine and something to eat and to meet up with friends and neighbours for a chat and a sociable evening. This year it will be a hog roast and puddings, with a vegetarian option. Less work for everybody and it sounds a really appetizing innovation.

Next is 'Carols on The Green' on Thursday 17 December at 7.00. This has taken place in all weathers, retreating to the Memorial Hall if it is really awful. (But this is Yorkshire, remember, and we don't give in easily!) If it's fine starry night this is an absolutely magical occasion, just gathering round the Christmas tree to sing carols for half an hour by torch light and the lights of the Christmas tree before hot-footing it to the hall for very welcome mince pies and mulled wine. It's especially good when, as has been the case for the last few years, there are a good number of families with young children there. One really hopes that, for the children especially, this will be one of their abiding memories of Christmas

Sadly, there won't be any carol singing round the village this year, which seems a great pity after many years of maintaining the tradition. People move away or run out of puff and, unfortunately we seem to have run out of new people to take it on. It's a loss to the village and also a financial loss to the church and the Memorial Hall. Thanks to the characteristic generosity of residents and people travelling via Scotch Corner Services, carol singing regularly raised £700 - £800 a year, for many years matched by Barclays Bank Matched Funding Initiative. Definitely the end of an era. (Or maybe just a pause of a year or two until a new group of singers take up the challenge.)

News from the parish council Village Website

Historic Milestone

Perhaps you have been wondering what is happening about the historic milestone which used to look so attractive sitting at the top of the Slough. Well, the intact bits have been removed for safe keeping. The residual base will be removed and the damage to the wall at the top of the Slough repaired as soon as the necessary planning permission has been given. Thereafter, it is to be hoped that the milestone can be repaired and, if so, repositioned on the village green where it should be safe from further vehicular damage.

SmartWater

If you are a member of Neighbourhood Watch (NHW) there is currently an offer whereby you can buy a SmartWater Home Security Pack (a forensic marking system capable of protecting household items such as tablets, smartphones, golf clubs, bicycles and jewellery etc) for a one off payment of £25 (compared with the normal <u>annual</u> price of £59.88. This offer is not open to non-NHW members - perhaps it is the stimulus you need to join? HGV's in the village

NYCC Highways were informed regarding the potholes on the bend by the church. These were inspected by NYCC Highways and three have now been patched. Potholes are only repaired once they meet the 40mm depth 'intervention level'.

The Beacon

Can you help us to make Christmas for some young service personnel who are in danger of being homeless this Christmas?

Lucy, Lottie, Millie and I are collecting: Toiletries (male and female) Tea, coffee, sugar, biscuits, UHT milk Cleaning products (washing powder, bin bags, washing up liquid, toilet rolls) Non perishable items (beans, soup, pasta, cakes) Christmas treats (mince pies, chocolate) Or anything else you would like to donate.

We'll be taking your donations to The Beacon, which is a new thirty-one unit housing, training and support centre based near Catterick Garrison, providing specialist support to single homeless veterans from around the country.

It targets single ex-servicemen and women who are most at risk of homelessness, providing them with temporary accommodation for up to 18 months. The centre provides access to top of the range IT equipment, on-site training facilities, as well as guiding residents into employment and permanent housing.

The Beacon is a lifeline to the small majority of people leaving the services who find themselves alone, homeless and struggling to re-adjust to civilian life. Christmas can be an especially bleak time.

Liz Simpson is happy to to accept at the Village Shop any donations that you wish to give and the shop has also kindly offered to make a donation. If you can help with a small gift from the list of

suggestions above you really make a difference to these young people.

We'll be taking everything to the Beacon on 21 December.

Thieves don't stop for Christmas

The nights are getting darker earlier and the demands of Christmas are drawing nearer. Just be aware at home to be secure when going out or being inside the house of making secure your outside doors are locked and that small valuables such as handbags, wallets and car keys are not left on display near outside doors. Take them upstairs when you go to bed. If going away consider automatic lights and cancel milk and papers and let your Neighbourhood watch coordinator know or a good neighbour. You can mark valuable property using Smartwater (www.Smartwater.com)or with an ultra violet pen with your postcode and house number. If parking your car up don't leave valuable items or presents in view. Satnavs and laptops can be tempting. Don't leave your keys in ignitions for even a short period- the garage forecourt, the paper shop. Please report any suspicious activity in your area. suspicious persons or person cold calling and call it in on 101. We are not having a high incidence of crime but let us keep vigilant and safe. 
