What's the first wildflower of spring in our villages? Not snowdrops or aconites, though they are much more spectacular and, in fairness, gladden the heart rather more. No, first off the blocks is the butterburr, shown above. It grows in drifts on the right hand side as you go down The Slough and starts to flower at the very beginning of January and is still in full bloom at the time of writing. It is actually quite an insignificant looking flower, more a whispered hint of spring than a joyful shout but very welcome even so, especially if it's <u>not</u> growing in your garden.

See the three fat little buds breaking through the leaf mould? They account for the plant's traditional name in Dorset of 'early mushroom'. It's not recommended eating but it used to be dried, powdered, mixed with wine and taken as a remedy for fevers and a preventative of the plague. Hence it's German name of *pestwurz*. Its common name here reflects the fact that the large flat leaves, which come later in the spring, were traditionally used to wrap butter. The leaves can grow as large as rhubarb leaves and were apparently used in this country in rural areas as a temporary sunhat or to keep off the rain. In fact, its Latin name, *petasites hybridus*, refers to an old Greek word, *petasos*, which was a wide-brimmed hat.

So much history in one small flower! No doubt the habit of younger brothers to throw the burrs which follow in late summer at outraged older sisters goes back to time immemorial too.

Thank you so much to all the generous people whose donations have made the occasional full colour picture in the Village News a possibility. A MESSAGE FROM YOUR VILLAGE SHOP

Sales in the first quarter of the Middleton Tyas Community Shop's financial year (Nov-Jan) have dropped dramatically and losses are mounting. Sadly, this really is now getting to be a very real case of 'use it or lose it'.

The arrival of Greggs and Subway at the Moto services has taken away a large share of our casual/passing trade. M&S made a huge impact on our sales when it arrived, and continues to do so, as does the ease of online shopping.

It has for a long time been a delicate balancing act to keep the shop making any sort of profit. But the average spend per customer has decreased along with the footfall, and unless both pick up, it can only spell the very unfortunate closure of the shop. We simply cannot afford to continue running at a loss.

We have tried to keep up with the times. We now have a website

(www.middletontyasvillageshop.com), we have a Facebook page (search for Middleton Tyas Community Shop & Post Office) and we have loyalty cards. We have also reduced our minimum spend when using a credit or debit card.

We have given the shop a makeover. Two new chillers replaced our very old one (fully paid for with grants), which gives us room for more variety in stock. We re-arranged other items to make finding them easier. We listened, as we always have done, to our customers' requests and have ordered stock accordingly whenever possible.

Reducing the opening hours wasn't a move we took lightly – we simply weren't making anywhere near enough in sales to cover the wages for those extra hours. Moreover, our willing band of volunteers is very small, and there just aren't enough of them currently to cover those hours.

We are part of the community and, because of that, we play our part by ordering local produce wherever we can. We sell eggs laid in Gilling West, Haigh's meats, honey from Richmond, and cakes from Richmond-based Edwina's too. We help local artists by providing an outlet for their cards and most of our meats and soups are good old Yorkshire produce. There's Liz-made meals of course too!

There is the once weekly coffee shop and we raised funds from organizing the Big Man's Breakfast. As research, we have visited other similar shops to ours in North Yorkshire and Northumberland to see what it is they are doing right, only to find very similar stock to ours, at far higher prices! Wherever we have visited, we have taken away good ideas for consideration and implementation.

Our message is simple - we, the community, need to turn this shop around or else we, the community, will lose it. And that would be a terrible shame, not just for those customers who stay loyal and depend on us, but to all the people who've put in such hard work in the eleven years it has served our village.

Report from Doctors' Lane Surgery

The Patient Participation Group (PPG) carried out an initial survey just before Christmas and is very grateful to everyone who took part. The survey was extremely useful and gave the group food for thought!

The results showed that, on the whole, patients are happy with the surgery and the services offered by the doctors and health professionals. On the basis of comments received about accessibility, the group concluded that the mix of appointments and daily open access was the still the best option. Doctors Lane Surgery is one of only two surgeries using this system in the Richmond, Hambleton and Whitby area. Other models had proved to have appointment availability problems.

Access to the surgery first thing in the morning also gave rise to several comments and is being considered as are the other comments made.

Citizens Advice Bureau (CAB)

We are fortunate that a representative from CAB holds drop-in sessions on Wednesday mornings in the surgery waiting room (a private area is also available for discussions).

Helping the frail elderly

The surgery has received funding for a project to support the frail elderly. Patients are identified using various factors including medication, hospital admissions and chronic disease. The aim is to improve the delivery of patient care by delivering holistic chronic disease management to patients in their own home and increase or improve the use of self-supported management. The practice nurses will arrange to visit those identified to carry out the checks.
