# Highlights of the summer




# The Royal Signals Northern Band.

# Village Shop and Post Office makeover

The Post Office, Memorial Hall Committee, and Village Shop Committee have joined forces to give the combined post office and shop a makeover. The post office will be updated and streamlined and provided with up to date equipment, and a great deal of the old manuals and form holders will be discarded, removing clutter. Expert shop fitters approved by the Post Office will carry out the carpentry work and revamp of the cable systems.

The Post Office and Shop will have the current window removed and a new entrance door provided with access through the memorial garden. Full planning permission has been given for this work by Richmondshire District Council, and North Yorks Building Control Partnership. The entrance path will be flagged with the same stone that exists in the garden and will provide improved wheelchair access. The existing patio area, which is already part flagged, will have slabs to replace gravel. The lower level garden will remain untouched.

Once the works are completed, new and improved signage will be positioned near the new entrance that will offer greater visibility to passers by. Additionally, there will be tables outside on the patio area for customers to take coffee and sandwiches al fresco. These changes are aimed at upgrading the post office and shop to make it more attractive to customers and increase the turnover of both facilities. Installation of the door will take one day, but the revamp of the post office could take a few days, during which time, unfortunately, it will have to remain closed. We will try to minimise the disruption to customers whilst the work proceeds.(Note that the shop sells stamps and can give cashback of up to £50 on debit cards after a minimum spend of £5)

Most, if not all, of the cost will be covered by grants, and, if there is a shortfall, it will be covered by the Friends of the Shop account. We also plan to run fund raisers later this year to keep the Friends account topped up. *Steve Hill*

#### **Transforming Our Communities**

NHS Hambleton, Richmondshire and Whitby Clinical Commissioning Group(CCG) is inviting residents of Hambleton and Richmondshire to have their say on the transformation of local community health services.

Top of the list of items for discussion, in our area, is the future of the Rutson Ward in Northallerton. It is located within an acute hospital and is not an ideal environment for community rehabilitation. In addition to this, GP access to these beds has been limited due to increased pressures from acute services and post hyper-acute stroke rehabilitation. #### WHEELS 2 WORK SCHEME

Are you young, just starting out on a job or training course or further education and having problems getting there on time because of transport difficulties?

If so, there is a charitable scheme called WHEELS 2 WORK which may be able to help. It is set up to provide 50cc mopeds on loan to young people wanting to fulfil their potential but who are struggling because of limited public transport between home and their place of work or training.

# Worried about keeping warm this winter?

One-off grants to help with heating costs this winter may be available to families on low incomes. More than 20 energy companies offer the Warm Home Discount scheme, which gives eligible customers a one-off grant towards their electricity bill or prepayment meter during the winter.

Schemes are set to open from around August time, and the payment is expected to remain the same as previous years at £140.

Families on low incomes or welfare are encouraged to get ahead of the queue and register their interest now with the support of the Warm and Well in North Yorkshire project, which seeks to raise awareness of cold homes. Although criteria for the grant variy according to the energy supplier, generally customers qualify automatically if they are in receipt of the Guarantee element of Pension Credit.

You may also be eligible if you receive certain means-tested benefits or have an annual income of less than £16,000 and there is a child under-5, someone with a disability, or someone elderly living at the property.

Kate Urwin, the Yorkshire Energy Doctor, who is working with Warm and Well, said "The £140 payment can go a long way to easing financial pressure on families during the winter, and is set up in such a way that it reaches those who need it the most. Customers can either apply online via their electricity supplier or call them up. It is a good idea to get in quickly as some schemes are first come first served and close when they have reached their maximum number of applicants."
