



The defibrillator is up and running

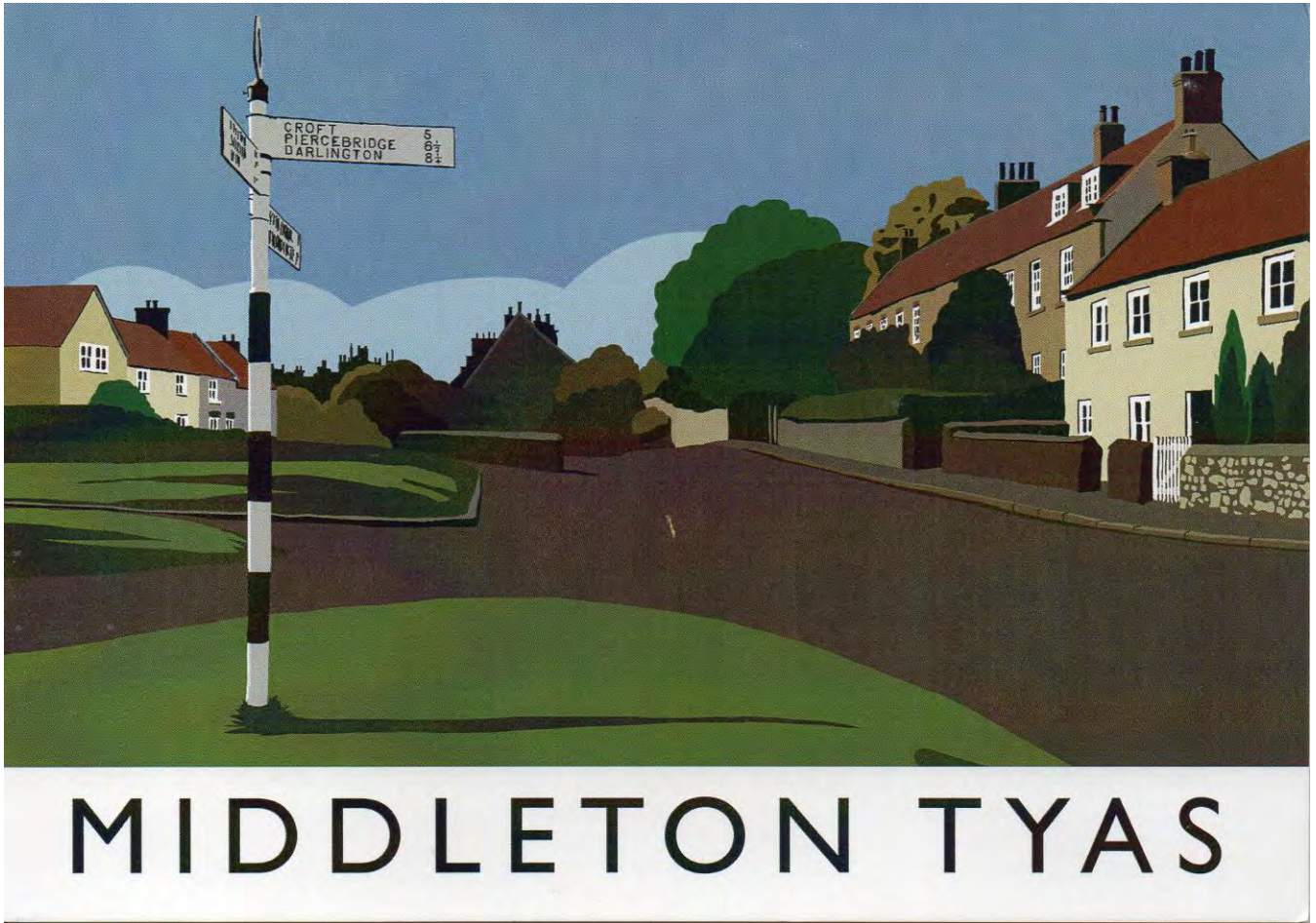
On Saturday 22 October Middleton Tyas resident Dr Richard James declared our defibrillator operational and ready to use. He said that in his years as a doctor he knew of several instances where quick access to a defibrillator had definitely contributed to saving somebody's life and he was very pleased to see that we now had one with easy access in the village. 'In fact', he added, 'a defibrillator comes second only to the flu jab in the number of lives it directly saves.' (You could see residents present making a mental note to ring the surgery next week about the flu jabs! Good on you, Dr James!)

The defibrillator was purchased as a result of a Parish Council initiative led by Councillor Josephine Collis. It cost about two and a half thousand pounds in round figures, about half of which came from the community, either as individual donations or through fund-raising events: Tony Smailes' talk about polar bears, a pub quiz organised by Dorothy Logan, an Open Gardens event by Michael Harris and Alan Middup and a Picnic on The Green organised by Susan and Norman Mahaffy. Very many thanks on behalf of us all to everybody who contributed in any way. That typically generous response to the appeal was just the evidence of community support for the project needed to enable the Parish Council to apply to RDC's Community Fund and North Yorkshire County Council for the remainder of the sum needed.

So what are we getting for our money? Our defibrillator was purchased through the charity Community Heartbeat Trust which has supplied the equipment and will maintain it and provide awareness raising sessions for the community at large and for volunteers willing to learn to support users. *Continues page 8 -*

News from the parish council

Surface Water Management Update

Slough run off to Cow Pasture

Works commenced below the Slough on 19 Sept when the contractor's excavations unearthed a large culvert adjacent to the road which was unmarked and not recorded by highways or NYCC. The contractor was therefore unable to proceed with the original design to divert water from the top of the Slough into Cow Pasture and a new design is being worked on. However, Landteam is pressing on with the proposed works at the bottom of the Slough at the point at which the culvert connects with the Oakfields stream and this will offer some relief while the other work is brought forward; work is due to start 24 October.

Landteam has carried out CCTV camera inspections along the accessible parts of the newly discovered culvert, tracking it back to the grass verge below Garden Cottage and across to Kneeton Park. Much of the culvert appears to be in excellent condition, however, there is evidence of a collapse which the contractors suspect to be the likely cause of water backing up and flowing overland in some parts of the village. This section will require repair and Landteam is approaching NYCC. Inaccessible sections of the culvert will require further investigation. Most of the culvert is along the highway and it is understood that it should be the responsibility of NYCC.

Scotch Corner Services run off to Middleton Tyas Lane

The planning application was validated last month and is now in consultation with RDC: it is expected to be determined on 11 Nov. Landteam has met with two further contractors who will be submitting prices for the work. As soon as these prices are in, and planning is approved, Landteam will revert to Moto and Eurogarages for agreement to the costs.

Village Farm and surrounding field catchment run off to Kneeton Park

Cleaning and minor repairs to the pipework at Kneeton Park commenced on 19 Sept and were due to be completed by 14 Oct. An additional manhole, which was buried, has now been raised and will serve as another access point for future maintenance. A detailed contour study has been completed for the fields to the north of Kneeton Park. Plans for the proposed attenuation allowing faster flowing water from Village Farm to escape

ahead of the field catchment, are still with the drainage engineer for review. These proposals will need to be considered in the context of the collapse / repair work required within the underground culvert below Kneeton Park and elsewhere as required. Landteam is committed to carrying out wider attenuation as required.

Milestone

The work to repair the Milestone is imminent. When complete, it will be relocated in a safe place on the Village Green to the left of Foresters Hall together with a plaque containing information about its history and recognizing the contribution of those who sponsored its repair.

Play Park

The Play Park has been closed temporarily as there are some safety issues – we are working closely with Richmondshire District Council on these and hope to re-open the facility just as soon as these have been resolved.

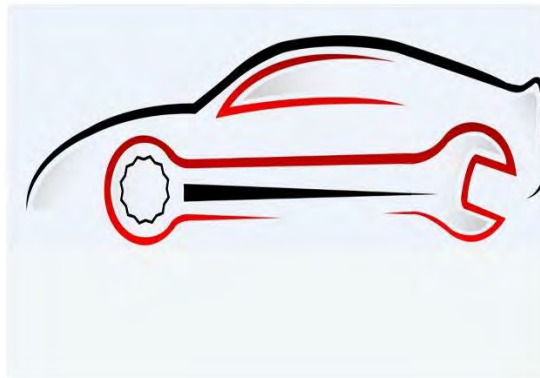
Community Defibrillator

We have been successful in obtaining a grant of £500 from the Richmondshire Area Partnership Funding Scheme. The Parish Meeting unanimously agreed to put the Best Kept prize money of £400 towards the project. We have an application to NYCC funding, the outcome of which will be decided in November. Cheques should be made payable to 'Moulton Village Association' which will safeguard the monies until we are able to purchase the equipment.

Killer Clowns

You have probably recently read or seen on the television something about the current wave of 'Killer Clowns'. It's a nasty practice which has arrived from the USA where people dressed as clowns jump out on people passing by. At the least it is very frightening, particularly to vulnerable people and children: at worst there have been instances of actual assault. The police report that there have now been several instances of this in the Richmond area during the hours of daylight and into the early evening in public and private areas.

If you see any instances of this happening please report them immediately to the police using the 101 service as the police are anxious to put a stop to the upset which this is causing.

Nottingham Knockers

The police are warning of a very unpleasant scam which may affect you.

Police forces across the country have been issuing alerts after a wave of crimes involving gangs of men who claim to be selling cleaning products but actually are scoping out the victim's house in preparation for a burglary at a later date. The scam often involves sellers - also known as Nottingham Knockers - who claim to be reformed convicts trying to make a new life for themselves or to be deaf or dumb and in need of cash to pay for their carer. The crooks go between houses appearing to offer a range of cleaning products but are secretly checking how much cash may be

in the house, whether the home is occupied or empty at certain times, how valuable the belongings are and how well protected the house is. A few days or weeks later, a different member of the gang returns to burgle the house using the intelligence gathered by the initial doorstep trader. Some scammers reportedly even sniff the bank notes they are paid with to judge whether they may have come from a larger wad of cash being stored somewhere in the house. So-called because the original scammers hailed from Nottingham and would come knocking door-to-door to trade their wares, the scam has spread across the country, sparking a number of police alerts. Forces across the country have issued warnings to vulnerable residents, especially the elderly, to be on their guard. In some cases doorstep hawkers have forced their way inside a property after being told to go away. Those who do pay up risk being added to a list of willing customers and are then targeted by other street sellers.

As well as the defibrillator, our package includes an emergency telephone so you can summon help and a de-choker to provide immediate help to someone who is seriously choking – an additional feature which you might not readily associate with a defibrillator. Don't feel that all this sounds too alarming and difficult for you. The

device includes step by step audio instructions on exactly what to do and the machine will simply not discharge where harm could be done to a person so it's impossible to make anybody's condition worse by using it. But, by acting promptly, you might just help to save a life.

Defibrillators are already installed at the school, The Shoulder of Mutton and Scotch Corner Services that we know of. In principle the advice is to go to the one that is nearest you as speed is of the essence. The advantage of the new defibrillator outside the Memorial Hall is that there is public access to it 24/7 so it is always available to anyone who needs it.

There will shortly be a community awareness-raising session so keep an eye open for the date on village notice boards or the village website. This will be followed up with more sessions for volunteers willing to provide immediate help and support in using the equipment for anybody who needs it. Now we just have to hope that we never need to use them.
