Driving in the dark



Whatever sort of rubbish picture is this? Well actually it's exactly what you see (or don't see) when you come off the brightly lit Scotch Corner and drive in the dark down the poorly lit main street of Middleton Tyas. This photo was taken about twenty yards uphill from the corner of Village Farm. You can just see the curve of the kerb at the junction into Village farm at the bottom of the picture. It was taken without flash but with a low light setting. The two white flashes on the right of the picture are reflections off registration plates of cars parked on the opposite side of the road. And here's the most terrifying thing: the flashes of light you see on the left are reflections and one rear light of the car parked further down the road which you are seeing over the roof of a car parked in front of it. The problem is that the car nearer you is parked the wrong way round, ie facing towards you, so there are no reflectors and the number plate is too dirty to reflect any light at a distance of about thirty yards.

Scary, isn't it? This is something which a number of people have asked me to mention in the Village News. It is an offence to park a car facing oncoming traffic during the hours of darkness. Something which we are all more likely to be guilty of is not wiping reflectors and lights on a regular basis. At this time of year and surrounded as we are by road works, it takes no time flat for them to become increasingly ineffective and you can see (or rather not see) what the consequences of that can be.

Community Defibrillator

After a wonderful Community effort, the defibrillator has been purchased and delivered to the village. It is located at the car park entrance to the Black Bull Inn and an awareness session will be held. If an emergency occurs, you must first dial 999. If appropriate, you will be asked if there is a defibrillator in the village and will be given instructions. The defibrillator itself also gives instructions in its use. Thanks once again to all who have made this important project possible.

Books in the Bus Shelter

The sale of books, DVDs and CDs in the bus shelter during January and February raised £23.35. Thanks to all who have supported the village. Good quality fiction books are always welcome. Please leave them in the bus shelter rather than trying to squeeze them into the boxes if they are full. Thanks.

Sadly, we have to report books and CDs have once again been stolen. This has been reported to the Police. The boxes and lids have been replaced by the Moulton Village Association.

All proceeds will go towards Moulton Village Association funds.

Highways Maintenance

Following a Freedom of Information request and some detective work, Highways are using the Government "Pothole Action Fund" to repair and resurface Hall Road from the Manor to Moulton Hall cattle grid. As we go to press, the work should have taken place in the week commencing 20 February.

The large pothole adjacent to St Andrew's Church has been repaired once again. Highways consider the other two large holes are not yet deep enough (40mm) to deserve repair. Once they reach this depth, they will be reported once again.

A request has been made to NYCC to refurbish the rumble strips on Scurragh House Lane and the Cowtons road together with cleaning drains on Scurragh House Lane that are full of silt. The new sign for the plinth on the Cowtons road should be delivered in the next two weeks and will be funded by the MVA.


