News from the parish council *Handyman*

The Parish Council is currently recruiting a Handyman for the Village. Those of you with eagle-eyes will have seen this on our Facebook page and on our website, but if not, please go to <u>http://www.middletontyas.org.uk/.../News_and_E</u> vents_24467.aspx where you will find more details.

Surface Water Management

Work continues behind the scenes to address surface water management issues. At Scotch Corner progress has been slowed by the NYCC requirement for three trial trenches to be dug to see if there is likely to be anything of archaeological interest to be found-let's hope not. The design work and revised calculations for the Slough diversion have been completed and, subject to NYCC consent, work could start before the end of March. Finally, the draft drainage report for the wider catchment above Kneeton Lane has been completed for Landteam and the final report is expected to be available shortly.

Play Park

Work continues on the Play Park. The fence is now in a good state with the signs relocated and the trim trail completed. The new waste bin and bench will be ordered this month. Until the weather improves it will be difficult to create a better, safe surface. Another inspection has now been requested and we are hopeful that a positive outcome will be reached before too much longer.

The defibrillator itself also gives instructions in its use. Thanks once again to all who have made this important project possible. The Best Kept Village 2016 plaque has been fixed to the defibrillator casing.

Community First Responders – -they save lives, you could too

The Community First Responder (CFR) Scheme is a partnership between Yorkshire Ambulance Service (YAS) and local groups of volunteers living within the community. As organized volunteers for the ambulance service we work as part of a dedicated team whose aim is to reduce the number of pre-hospital deaths in Yorkshire.

In many medical emergencies, the first few minutes are critical and, if effective treatment can be provided within that time, lives can be saved. We are trained by YAS in basic life support skills: Cardio Pulmonary Resuscitation (CPR), the use of Automated External Defibrillators (AED) and administration of oxygen.

You need to be at least 16 years old, have a clean driving licence and access to a car when on duty. Full training is given by YAS and uniform and equipment is provided. We expect a commitment of about four hours a week but the actual time volunteers are 'on call' is decided by them. Reducing local NHS medicines waste

NHS Hambleton, Richmondshire and Whitby Clinical Commissioning group (the CCG) is running a campaign called 'Help save NHS Resources', encouraging patients to think about the cost to the *LOCAL* NHS when prescription medicines are wasted or ordered without looking at alternatives.

Wasted medicines cost our LOCAL NHS nearly £1 million a year – this could pay for one of the following:

- 1058 days of care in an Intensive Treatment Unit for critically ill patients
- 5389 outpatient appointments with a consultant
- 1764 days of treatment in a Special Baby Care Unit for seriously ill babies
- 20,000 GP appointments
- 99,700 blood tests
- 20 community nurses
- 16,363 hearing tests



Also, it costs the NHS four times more to provide paracetamol on prescription than it does to buy them in a local pharmacy or supermarket which can also supply advice and medication to manage minor ailments such as cold sores, headaches, infant colic and eczema.

Janet Probert, Chief Officer of the CCG said: 'The NHS is facing serious financial challenges – this will come as no surprise to our residents so we are urging ev3eryone to look at things a little differently.

When next ordering repeat prescriptions, please check what supplies you already have. It may not be necessary to order all your medicines every time, especially those which are not taken every day.

We fully appreciate that some of our patients still need to order medications on prescription so we are raising awareness to those patients with less serious conditions who may be able to visit a pharmacist, go to their local supermarket or even look in their medicine cabinet to see what they already have.'
