# Scotch Corner preserves its mystery

One of the main reasons for the extension to the road building programme at Scotch Corner is to enable the excavation of a newly discovered archaeological site to be completed. Why is it taking so long and what's involved?

Excavation is currently taking place in two sites to the north west of Scotch Corner. These two areas are located at either end of the old VOSA weighbridge site and will provide a new slip road on to the northbound A1 as well as a new access to the VOSA. This doesn't involve digging in a new area: it's a question of finishing a task which has become more and more productive and mysterious as work has gone on.

The normal protocol with archaeological work ahead of road building is that after a comprehensive survey and assessment phase of known archaeological sites, a system of work is agreed so that they are left intact or mitigation measures are agreed if sites are to be destroyed. Where possible, plans for the road development are fine-tuned to enable archaeological remains to be left in place with the road built over or around the archaeology. This has been the case, for instance, with the access track to Violet Grange. Excavation ultimately involves the destruction of archaeological deposits so wherever possible the remains are preserved in situ.

Only where the construction of a new road or the associated infrastructure involves serious incursions into the site, as with Scotch Corner are artefacts recovered during archaeological excavation. In these cases archaeological remains and deposits are excavated as far down as there is any evidence of human activity.

The initial results from the A1 survey shows that the combined local Iron Age and Roman settlement at Scotch Corner occupied a site of roughly 1.4km from north to south and up to 1km wide from east to west. Significant parts of this at the northern and southern ends have potentially been damaged by intensive ploughing and cultivation since the mid-twentieth century. In the undisturbed area, where evidence of medieval ridge and furrow cultivation survives as earthworks, bedrock is often quite near the surface so that items of archaeological interest began to be found almost as soon as digging started. There proved to be a tremendous amount which <u>is</u> of interest and is still being removed for further analysis.

What's so special about Scotch Corner? Where shall we start!? Firstly, there is clear evidence of early Stone Age activity dating back 8 - 10 thousand years when the people living there would just have been changing from being basically nomadic hunter-gatherers to permanently located farmers. Nobody knew that before.

Secondly, there is significant evidence of Iron Age settlement at what we now think of as Scotch Corner and along the A66 and A6108 towards Richmond. There were clearly round houses, enclosures and fields and it is clear that Scotch Corner and the surrounding area had long been a major junction before the Romans arrived.

Roman discoveries at Scotch Corner have caused a re-think in several ways about what the 'Roman Occupation' really involved. Archaeologists did not expect to find an extensive Roman site at Scotch Corner but early in the stripping period evidence of Roman activity was identified. Some of these finds suggested a military presence but there was nothing to suggest a military base or fort at the site though plenty of evidence of Roman rectangular buildings alongside the round houses of the local Iron Age population. There is no evidence of existing buildings being destroyed by the Romans (no sign of deliberate fire, for instance.) So did the Romans live here peaceably with the native population?

# Scotch Corner preserves its mystery

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The next piece of the puzzle is that there have been found large quantities of fragments of high quality glass, pottery, a polished copper mirror and other artefacts which suggest a very prosperous lifestyle. It can also be dated very precisely. Some of the glass, for instance, is identical to and contemporary with glass found at Pompeii which can be dated as being produced not later than 55 – 60 AD. That puts its arrival at Scotch Corner around ten years earlier than any one thought the Romans were in the North of England. So they were here and heading north at a very early stage of what we think of as the Roman Occupation. Why?

There is evidence of considerable industrial activity too. Probably most fascinating is the discovery of a mould for making the metal pellets from which coins would be stamped, making Scotch Corner the most northerly example of coin production ever found in Europe. No hordes of gold coins, alas, but a clear indication that Scotch Corner was involved in the initial stages of coin production. Tantalizing for local residents is the fact that there is evidence of copper being worked at Scotch Corner, though we don't know what was being made. Did the Romans know of and exploit the copper deposits in Middleton Tyas? We may never know the answer to that.

Despite the apparent prosperity and industrial activity going on at Scotch Corner, there is something very temporary about the Roman stay here. Initial analysis would suggest that most buildings were single storey wooden constructions and there has been no evidence of ramparts or fortifications. Archaeologists are certain that within thirty years or so, the Romans had pressed on further north and, locally, had consolidated their activity on Catterick, which was becoming an important economic and administrative centre.

The feeling is now that perhaps the Romans came, bringing gifts of the highest quality, to win the hearts and minds of the native population, possibly focusing on the settlement at Stanwick where the Iron Age Queen Cartimandua was installed. Her compliance might have been critical to a much wider acceptance of the Roman presence.

One last mystery. Archaeologists have discovered at Scotch Corner a number of claylined Iron Age pits that had been cut into the rock and it is here that they have discovered the broken remains of large quantities of fine Roman glass, pottery and other high status items.. It is evident that the pits were then backfilled and left. A sacrifice, a deliberate rejection of the Roman offerings? We may never now what prompted this very considered action.

Within half a century the Romans, like many other occupying forces since, had discovered that plying the natives with gifts doesn't necessarily produce the results they wanted and by AD 80 –

100 'military solutions' were beginning to be applied. But by then Scotch Corner's Roman heyday was already a thing of the past.


