## Time to stage a comeback

Don't shoot the messenger if it doesn't happen exactly on time but the Parish Council was informed at its September meeting that Scotch Corner roundabout will be fully open on 10 October and the A1M will be fully open on 15 December. Hurrah!!! Does that mean we can finally have our village back and start the process of tidying it up and making it a beautiful place to live, if not as quietly rural as it once was?

The picture above on the left shows the sort of scruffy air of neglect that has overtaken us for the past couple of years while the road works at Scotch Corner have been going on.

The Parish Council is firmly behind a suggestion that we should embark on a 2 - 3 year programme of planting bulbs and wild flowers in and around the village, involving as many people as we can. The plan is to start in a small way this autumn, planting 750 daffodil bulbs in the village and follow that up in the early spring with many more snowdrops, planted 'in the green' so we shall begin to see them in flower February 2019.

Hopefully we can continue this on what are currently bald spaces at the end of Kneeton Lane and around the Scotch Corner entrance to the local access road leading towards Moulton where there is the potential for planting wildflowers to ensure a blaze of colour throughout the spring and summer. However, every journey, as we know, begins with a single step, so let's focus on what is achievable in the next couple of months.



First thing is to find out what you would like to see and where; whether you would like to donate towards the cost of planting or would be willing to help with the actual planting. Suggestions for potentially lovely spots around the village places which could be enhanced by a showing of daffodils and snowdrops, even if they are pretty overgrown at present, would be very welcome. The well head in Smith Gutter Lane is one such but there must be plenty more. It may even be the verge outside your garden or the bottom of a hedge somewhere.

One word of advice on this though: we've been recommended not to plant within about a metre of the main road. Winter salt spreading would kill off bulbs in no time.

We'll be planting in clumps of ten bulbs so it shouldn't take too long if there are perhaps a dozen of us doing the planting and it would be great to hear from some young people who would like to be involved.

If you would like to contribute to the cost, ten bulbs cost about £3.50 so how about working in multiples of that? A swathe of flowers coming up each year might be a nice way to remember somebody but equally, wouldn't it make a lovely birthday present or just a gift to say thank you for some small kindness?

## Don't stockpile medicines

You will be helping the local NHS to save about £1 million a year if you if you order your repeat prescriptions when you actually need them rather than re-ordering the whole lot when you collect your current prescription. Re-ordering when you actually need something helps the NHS to better manage its finances and its stocks of medicines and would greatly reduce the very expensive stockpiling of unwanted medicines at home. This is easy to manage if you order your medication on-line via a mobile phone, tablet or computer. (Don't worry if you don't have one of these. There will still be someone at the surgery to help if you telephone or call for a repeat prescription.)

You can register on-line by calling in at your GP surgery with some identification and filling in a short form. You will then be given your own user name and a temporary password which will enable you to access the on-line service. You will also be able to book or cancel GP surgery appointments the same way.
