Community First Responders

It is nearly a year since I started the scheme at a local level here in Middleton Tyas. At the time of writing, from 17 April to date we have attended 24 calls, all as a result of 999 calls. Although we might wish none of them had been necessary, I am sure our presence, together with that of the regular Ambulance Service, was a godsend to the unfortunate people involved.

Community support has been patchy, The Memorial Hall Committee has kindly allowed us to use the hall on two evenings for our training sessions and a Bridge Afternoon, also in the hall, provided a kick start for our fund raising to purchase uniform and equipment. Several months ago I also wrote to all the businesses on the Scotch Corner Services area, Middleton Lodge and the Parish Council hoping for some support but haven't had a response as yet.

So it is working but we could do so much more. My main plea is for more volunteers. We should like to have enough volunteers to offer cover every day but with only three teams, which is what we have at present, that's difficult.

January is the traditional time for recruitment so I am hoping about six more people will join this very worthwhile cause. How about it? If you are interested, please call me and I will give you any information you need to help you make the decision. The minimum age is 16 and there is no upper age limit. I know of one responder who is 89!

Finally, the usual plea of any volunteer group trying to provide a service is, of course, money. During this year we need to find about £1000 for uniform and equipment. Need I say more?

Thanks for reading this and I hope you feel that you might be able to help in some way. We really

do need your support and, you never know, you might need us one day.
