

Update on Defibrillator Awareness and Training.

Two training sessions have taken place in our Memorial Hall this winter. We are fortunate to have a very competent trainer who is provided by the Community Heartbeat Trust with the Local Council and the Parish Council providing the funding for these valuable sessions. They have been very successful events with those participating advising that they feel much more confident in their ability to help should a situation arise. Another session of introduction and awareness is being held in the **Memorial Hall at 7pm on 6th February**. Please do come along if you would like to find out more. You are welcome to bring family members or friends - whether or not they live in our Villages. Do come - you just might save a life.

Little White Bus - new service now running to Teeside Park

For residents this now means that we can go from Middleton Tyas at 11.25 to Barnard Castle on Mondays and Fridays, to Teeside Park on Tuesdays at 11.25, and on Thursdays to Ripon at 10.05. You get about two hours at your destination and the return bus gets you back to the Village a little after 2pm. Wednesdays are free, but with all that travel, we need a day's rest! Don't forget that your bus pass is valid on these services. We fought hard to retain these services, please make sure they are used.

The Friarage Hospital

At the November meeting of the PC, we were visited by Berenice Groves, Director of Operations and Stuart Finn, Service Manager for Anaesthetics, Theatres & Acute Pain Services who wished to spread information and dispel myths relating to the Friarage Hospital. It was an excellent presentation and a welcome initiative from the Friarage.

They explained that the Friarage is not threatened with closure: it is a fundamental part of the South Tees operation. They are currently increasing resources in some areas such as oncology so that patients will be able to go there for chemo and radiotherapy instead of travelling to James Cook.

Currently, there is a national shortage of anaesthetists and South Tees are struggling to recruit and retain them. In common with many other trusts, they are very reliant on locums which causes many problems. As a result, they are looking at reducing some emergency services so that they do not need to provide 24 hour anaesthetist cover - in fact, serious emergencies such as major injuries, strokes, heart attacks already go straight to either the Memorial in Darlington or James Cook so this is not a major change.

It was stressed that The Friarage **will stay open**, there are no plans for any closures. Government is being lobbied in relation to the provision of training programmes and the Trust is advertising actively to recruit more staff.

We were reassured that the Friarage is a valuable asset for the area and were pleased to hear that the problems were more about how to recruit and manage staffing levels, rather than any lack of funding. Ms Groves noted that the Robert Ogden Cancer Centre will open shortly; they have a new MRI Scanner; and there is a new Opthalmology Centre on site. The major problem is not funding, it is recruitment and staffing for the Critical Care Centre.

The overwhelming message to residents is that the Friarage will remain open.

Community Speed Watch

Community Speed Watch is a scheme designed to support local communities to improve road safety by allowing residents to address speed concerns in their community with the support of North Yorkshire Police.

Through the programme we aim to deter drivers from speeding in 20, 30 and 40 mph zones to improve the safety and quality of life of residents.

Update from the Community First Responders

Tony Smailes talked to the Parish Council at the December meeting. Within the radius of 5-6 miles of his home in Oakfields, the CFRs answered nine calls over the Christmas period, three of which were life-threatening. Although we are not allowed to have full details of these cases, it is known that they were classified as "red" calls meaning that they were Heart Attacks, Seizures, Strokes or something considered of an equally series situation. Tony is our local co-ordinator and would be pleased to hear from anyone who wishes to join the CFR team.

It's snowdrop time

This month will see snowdrops and aconites springing up, showing that however cold it still feels Spring is on the way and we can get back to our programme of bulb planting.

Over the winter period the parish council has negotiated a license agreement with NYCC which officially allows us to go ahead with planting in virtually all the places in the village we asked for. This is brilliant news which means that we can go ahead next autumn and complete our planned daffodil planting. We can also start planting snowdrops in the green Planting snowdrops in small clumps when they have finished flowering but have not died back produces much better results than planting dry bulbs. The trouble is, they are quite expensive to buy in the quantity we need. If you have snowdrops on your land or in your garden and would be willing to share anything from a trowel-full to several spades-worth, I should be delighted to hear from you. We can come and lift them under your direction or you could just leave them on my doorstep. Any type and any quantity will be very welcome and February/March is the right time to do it.

The next big step forward will be to secure permission to plant bulbs and other plants at the top of the village near Scotch Corner and at the Kneeton Lane/LAR junction. We will keep you posted on progress with this.
