# Conservation of wildlife and ground nesting birds

It is coming up to a very busy time of year for all birdlife. Dennis Parvin and the team at Murky Hill are working hard to create a habitat that is conducive to success of all birdlife and the farm is lucky to have a small number of the native and increasingly rare grey partridge, as well as waders such as lapwing, oystercatchers and curlew.

These species are declining in number and key to their success is providing safe habitat. Dennis has had to speak to a number of people recently about controlling their dogs. Disturbance due to dogs hunting in fields, hedgerows and wildlife corridors can make the difference between success and failure for these species. The footpaths are an excellent resource for the village but can we ask you to ensure that walkers remain on the footpath and their dogs under <u>very</u> close control or on the lead please.

## News from your Parish Council

Just a reminder: Please don't leave valuables in sight in your car!

#### **Northallerton Courthouse**

There is a proposal to close Northallerton Courthouse . The Parish Council has been asked to make a response to this proposal. We have done so and are opposed to this measure.

#### Playpark and Sports Field update

Since taking over the responsibility for the Play Park and Sports Field, the Parish Council has been faced with a number of new challenges and a steep learning curve in terms of Health and Safety with respect to all users of both facilities, young and old. With this in mind, your Council embarked on a project, first of all to ensure that the present Play Park was made safe and up to an acceptable standard then to upgrade and develop the facilities for all users. These include pre-school children to 15 vear olds, disabled residents of all ages, adults, and the more mature residents of our village, as well as for wider community events. We are currently looking at three concept proposals and intend to consult as many people as we can, particularly those who have ideas they would like to share with us. When we have firmed up and selected a partner we will organise a presentation of the whole scheme to the village and other stakeholders and finally seek financial grants to see the project through. In the meantime, we will continue with our fundraising during the year, in order to raise as much match funding as we can. Watch this space!

#### **Bulb Planting**

The planting of bulbs in the Village continues with snowdrops being the next priority. All help is welcome with this task, please contact Diana Thomas on 01325 377311 if you are able to offer some time.

#### Village Speed Awareness Initiative

Many people have raised concerns about traffic going at excessive speed through the village, and we are sure that we would like to see it reduced both for safety and the environment. Many villages have already joined the Speed Awareness Scheme, to help remind drivers of the need to obey the local limits of 20, 30 and 40mph when travelling through their villages. Some roads are narrow with sharp bends and it can be very worrying trying to cross the road, particularly if you have children or are elderly. In order to get the scheme up and running here in Middleton Tyas, we do need another two volunteers. #### **Surface Water Management**

Progress continues to be made in improving surface water management in the village. The works completed by Landteam on the Slough have been seen in action on several occasions recently and it is clear that they are diverting water into Cow Pasture and away from the drains at the bottom of the village.



Similarly, the recently constructed ponds behind Village Farm have been filling with water and reducing significantly the flow down to Kneeton Lane. At the top of the village Edward Speir is in ongoing discussions with the MOTO and Eurogarages legal teams and he believes that agreement is near. In between the top and the bottom of the village there remain problems with the drains on Middleton Tyas lane which will be at least partly addressed by the proposed catchment pond below the service area. The water going onto the roads near to the new Dixholme houses is a relatively new issue and we understand that responsibility for that is being disputed by Highways England and Yorkshire Water -we are trying to find out more about this. Photos below show the improvements to Cow Park and the new Catchment Pond behind Village Farm.
