Local Access Road

A survey of traffic using the local access road took place in the week commencing 9 July. Following concerns by residents, we were particularly monitoring HGVs and low loaders using the road, despite it being signed at Scotch Corner, "unsuitable for heavy vehicles". A relatively small number of these vehicles were noted and of equal concern was the speed of all vehicles, including tractors and trailers. Our Rural Beat Manager, PC Mark Wood, attended a Parish Meeting on 16 August to discuss speeding.

This month, we are drawing to your attention just one item in the Village News. The minutes of the meeting will be posted for all residents very shortly on our newly-refurbished website. Take a look on www.middletontyas.org.uk

It will not have escaped any resident's attention that many of the 20mph painted speed restriction signs on the road around our Village have become faded or simply worn with time and wear. Perhaps because of this invisibility, the speed with which drivers travel through our Village appears to be on the increase.

The fact is that, despite our close proximity to the A1, this is a rural Village with a thriving local primary school and residents of all ages. People are of utmost importance. Another fact - slowing down in the last 100m before a school does not help children to walk or cycle the entire route to school or prevent many casualties. 80% of child casualties are on non-school trips. The 20mph speed limit emphasises quality of life - where day-to-day living - walking, cycling, talking and play - take precedence over traffic movements. It makes for a greener, quieter environment for all of us.

Adherence to the 20mph speed limit means that there is less risk of serious injury (20% fewer casualties), particularly in children and the elderly. It means that we will be reinforcing healthier lifestyles by encouraging walking and cycling. A safe village will promote the renewal of community life, where sociability and the positive atmosphere we all want makes our Village more attractive, aids business and reinforces property values.

Statistics show that you are 7 times less likely to die if hit at 20mph than 30mph - 10 times less likely if you are over 60 years of age. In the distance a 20mph car can stop, a 30mph car will still be doing 24mph. It has to be better to just miss than actually hit someone.

By community engagement to voluntarily comply with the 20mph speed limit, our cars naturally act as pacer vehicles for for visitors and others road users. The Parish Council are in the process of organising a Speed Awareness Team who will be operating in the Village in due course. We do hope that we can rely on residents of this cherished Village to help us to keep our Village safe.

November 11 2018

There is to be a national commemoration to mark the end of the Great War. Manfield is taking part by joining over 1200 cities, towns and villages and holding a brazier bonfire on the village playing field.

The field will be open to visitors from 18.00 and the event will begin at approximately 18.40, Names of those who gave their lives and those who served will be read out by Colonel Jeremy Dodd and Major(Retd) John Tong . A two minute silence will be observed followed by the sounding of the Last Post and Reveille by Mr Nicholas Wilson. The fire will be lit by Councillor Shirley Dodd, whose great uncle, Private Thomas Gowton, 4th Battalion Yorkshire Regiment, was killed at Armentieres 6th October 1915 and by Councillor Malcolm Hird whose family served in various theatres of war.

The Village Hall will be re-open again from 19.05 - 21.00 serving refreshments. There is no entrance fee. However, a collection and all monies raised will be donated to a Military Charity.

Please support the memory of those who gave their lives and to those who served their country. They are commemorated in Manfield Church and for those service personnel are now suffering from injuries – physical and mental – sustained in recent actions: the Falklands Northern Ireland, Kosovo, Sierra Leone, Iraq, Afghanistan and elsewhere.
