From the Parish Council Planning Applications ~

It is great to have as many responses from the community as possible when it comes to Planning Applications. The Parish Council is asked to comment on all Planning Applications and we need the views and opinions of residents to shape our responses, whether you support, object to, or have no comment to make on the proposals.

The recent Planning Application from West Hall has generated a huge interest from residents and the application was discussed at our September meeting. In our response letter to the Local Planning Authority we shall be reiterating our concerns raised from the previous application submitted in February this year, as well as including the concerns of residents relating to the new proposed access, the detrimental effect this will have on the Village Shop and Village Hall, and the significant harm caused by demolition of Listed Buildings and removal of wall has to the appearance of the Conservation Area.

We are going to make it easier for residents to know about future Planning Applications by sharing a link on the Middleton Tyas Community Facebook page. You will then be able to comment online direct to Richmondshire District Council through their 'Public Access' page. Updating the Middleton Tyas Conservation Area Appraisal and Management Plan ~

In the last decade our village has seen many changes, such as new houses, the closure and conversion of the Bay Horse Public House to residential dwellings, and new road layouts.

The Parish Council is looking for residents to get involved with helping to update the Middleton Tyas Conservation Area Appraisal and Management Plan. This Plan acts as a Supplementary Planning Guidance document for the Local Planning Authority to take into consideration when deciding on Planning Applications for our village. The Plan was first adopted by Richmondshire Planning Department in 2008 but is now out of date. A copy of the current plan can be viewed on Richmondshire District Council's website - www.richmondshire.gov.uk/planning/building-conservation/conservation-areas/conservation-area-appraisals-and-management-plans/

There have been more than 20 Planning Applications for our village so far this year, so it is vitally important we keep our Conservation Area Appraisal and Management Plan up to date and relevant. If you are interested in Planning, or want to help shape the village for future generations, or have a wealth of knowledge of the history of Middleton Tyas, or maybe you are a student who wants to be an Architect, Designer, or Town and Country Planner; or perhaps you were involved with the original committee. Doctors Lane Surgery (Aldbrough St John) Flu Clinics 2018

Yes – it is time to think about Flu already! The doctors at Doctors Lane Surgery want let you know the arrangements for the open Flu Clinics for 2018. You may notice that the dates are slightly later than usual this year. This is because of the timing of the delivery of the vaccines to the surgery. For this reason, no vaccines will be given in general and open surgeries before the date of the last Flu clinic on the 21st November 2018.

If you don't want to have the flu vaccine this year, please let the Surgery know as soon as possible so we can update our records. This will stop further invites for this year's campaign.

For most people, flu is nasty but not serious. Those with flu tend to experience a short period of chills, aches and pains and then a return to normal health. However, those patients over 65 or with chronic disease are at greater risk from the effect of flu. For them flu can increase the risk of more serious illnesses such as bronchitis and pneumonia or can make existing conditions worse. In the worst case, flu can result in a stay in hospital, or even death.

The Department of Health are recommending that we offer flu vaccinations to all our patients who will be aged 65 before 31st March 2019, those who suffer from Asthma, COPD, Diabetes, Stroke, Ischaemic Heart Disease, patients with low immunity, pregnant patients, patients who are Carers and also patients with a BMI of over 40.

Patients under 18 years of age will receive a separate letter when their vaccination becomes available.

Dogs in Our Play Area

There has been an increased number of dogs being allowed into our Children's Play Park beside the MUGA. We would like to remind everyone that this area does not permit dogs and is solely for the children to play in. If you are walking your dog, please continue to do so in the main football field. If you see someone with a dog in the Play Park please let the Parish Council know. Contact details are displayed at the entrance.



The Problem

Dogs on children's playgrounds represent a major health and injury hazard:

- Toxocariasis - a rare infection caused by roundworm parasites, most commonly found in cats', dogs' and foxes' faeces.
- Children and young adults are usually affected due to contact with contaminated soil or sand within play areas by swallowing the infected egg.
- There is evidence that dogs can also carry E.coli and Hepatitis in their faeces.
