*Please* excuse the absence of the shop page in May's edition. Craig was away and then I was away, and in the meantime my email didn't want to play with the News' email and so there was no page. Yeah I know, relief!

*Anyhow*, we held a book sale in May as part of our normal fundraising efforts. A lot of people made use of this by getting rid of a load of books, and then a few people came along and bought them. Thanks to everyone who donated, and a bigger thanks to those who helped set up and run the sale, and those who came to it.

*This* is a just so you know ... during recent discussions with the Post Office about Dorothy's job, the PO stated that if the shop should ever close, our Post Office would close too. Even though they are separate businesses, the shop pays the rent and the power bills for that whole section of the building. If the shop can't do it, basically the PO ain't interested.

*We* recently had our AGM, so for those who couldn't make it, are not shareholders, are shareholders who haven't told me they've changed their email address, are shareholders who when reading the letters 'AGM' fall promptly asleep, or just anyone who is interested in the welfare of their village shop, last financial year (Oct 17 – Oct 18), we made a profit of £915. Not much but enough to keep us in our aprons for another year.

*Mary* Parvin has entered the Macmillan Cancer Support Northumberland Coast Mighty Hike which takes place on 6 July. Last year she did the one in the Lake District and like last year, she has asked for support from the village. With the winner getting one of her marvellous Christmas cakes, you can have a go at guessing the time she will take to walk, stumble, gallop like a little pony or skip like a toddler on a sugar high around the 26 mile course. Entry is £2 with all money raised going to Macmillan.

*Keep* an eye out for news on our 15<sup>th</sup> birthday celebration on 20 July. This will be dinner in the Hall and tickets will be available soon. Fifteen years is a great achievement for a community shop so do think about coming and helping us celebrate this!

*Have* you been bothered by the noise of traffic from the A1 since the upgrade? Removal of trees and foliage from beside the road seems to have caused an increase to the noise. There is such a thing apparently as acoustic fencing that will reduce the noise, and some has been installed near Brompton on Swale. Liz Timmins, who lives a few houses down from the services, has spoken to Angus Thompson and various authorities on this, and has prepared a letter that she plans to send to Highways. Copies of this letter are available in the shop or direct from Liz, who is making her way slowly around the village. ## Ore-some Copper Belles WI

Well we were just 'buzzing' with excitement this month as we listened to Sadie Whent give a fascinating talk on the world of bees. Honey bees play an important role in pollination and without them many crops we eat would not exist. Beekeeping not only produces honey for us to eat but it also helps farmers to increase their yield and consequently provides more food for us. Beekeeping, we discovered, is a very complex science.

Sadie took us through the annual calendar of a beekeeper; the different duties throughout the months and seasons and the varied equipment required. We learned all about the different roles bees have within the colony: the female worker bees who do all the work (housekeeping) in the hive; the male drone bees whose job is to mate with the Queen; and the Queen bee herself who leads the colony and is the only bee that can lay fertilised eggs. The bees decide who gets the different roles depending on what is required within their workforce and, when new colonies are needed, they raise new Queens through the feeding of 'royal jelly'. Sadie also brought some of the different honeys that they produce allowing us to explore the unique tastes characterised by the different plants that the bees are exposed to. They really were distinctive in their different flavours. Thanks to Sadie for a fascinating talk. We all learned so much and this is just the basics. Who would have thought a simple pot of honey had such a complex process behind it?

Join us next month on Tuesday 11<sup>th</sup> May at 7pm in the Middleton Tyas Village Hall for a session. For those joining in, remember to wear comfy clothes and bring a water bottle.
