2020 VISION... AND BEYOND

I am organising an event in the Memorial Hall, for the evening of 7th **Feb 2020**, when an illustrated talk will be given by a speaker from The Auckland Project (a charity based in nearby Bishop Auckland). It will include the origins, current attractions, and the future plans and developments of this exciting Project. Jonathan Ruffer, multimillionaire, philanthropist, art lover, man of Faith, first came to local attention when, in 2012, he saved for the nation, twelve important C17 paintings by the Spanish artist Zurbaran. He also saved Auckland Castle, once the Palace (with throne room) of the powerful Prince Bishops of old, and in which these paintings hung.

In 2015 Jonathan Ruffer brought to Bishop Auckland the unique outdoor spectacle of 'Kynren'; an epic tale of North East England over the centuries. Performed to a crowd of 8000, and initially led by the noted French group 'Puy du Fou', it has subsequently been staged annually by a local cast and crew of over 1000. I'm sure we'll all be fascinated to learn much more about the Auckland Project, and of the founder himself- what he has done, and what he fully intends to do for his community, and how he is putting Bishop Auckland firmly on the map.

On my most recent visit up the newly built Auckland Tower in the Market Place, then into the Mining Art Gallery close by (showing the work of the Pitman Painters), an employee spoke with genuine warmth and sincerity, telling me "**Mr Ruffer? He's the real deal...**". That says a lot. Entry tickets £7- ticket includes a pre-talk glass of wine and nibbles, served from 7pm in the Memorial Hall. **Talk begins at 7:30pm.** Tickets can be purchased from the village shop from **7**th **December 2019**, or directly from myself (Susan- Tel: 377600). SCHOOL NEWS

Well, school has been very busy since we returned from the October half term holiday. Over at our Eppleby Forcett site some of the Preschool children went pumpkin picking recently and this sparked an interest in pumpkins. The children then looked at how they grow and then carved out the middle and made pumpkin gloop for a fabulous sensory experience. They also talked about Bonfire Night and the sounds the fireworks made before making their own rockets from card and paper. In Reception, the children have enjoyed learning all about Diwali. They used coloured rice to make Rangoli patterns and made saltdough lamps. They have also been talking about the Guy Fawkes and they created a magnificent outdoor artwork using powder paint to represent the exploding fireworks. The children have also enjoyed a "bedtime stories" session where they came along in their pyjamas to listen to stories whilst enjoying a warming cup of hot chocolate and biscuits before being given a book to go home with.

In Year 1 the class have been celebrating Autumn in many different ways this week, from maths, to music, to artwork! They have also been looking at those responsible for the Gunpowder Plot and have made some amazing 'WANTED' posters! Meanwhile in Year 2 they have continued their investigations into those responsible for the Gunpowder Plot and have done some very descriptive writing and have also produced some explosive chalk firework posters.

Our Year 3 children have used their science knowledge of magnets and forces to design and make a magnetic game. They really enjoyed this topic and were eager to try out each others' games. A very excited Year 4 went off to Robinwood for their residential trip where they got to experience new and exciting challenges such as canoeing and climbing, which gave them opportunity to grow in confidence, works as a team and discover new skills. They have started their new text "Gulliver's Travels" and have been writing diary entries as if they were Gulliver and have also been developing their letter writing skills in anticipation of their new Pen Pal letters arriving from another school very soon!

In Year 5 the children enjoyed an amazing Tudor banquet to celebrate all that they have learnt in History on Tudor food for the rich and poor. The food was delicious with the pork pies being the most popular! The children then worked to plan a banquet themselves by finding the lowest prices for the items they needed. In literacy they have been writing in the style of Tudor estate agents and have also begun creating 3D models of Tudor homes. We have welcomed back our Year 6 children from their residential trip to East Barnby where they had the most amazing time canoeing, rock climbing, orienteering and river scrambling! Since their return they have been using figurative language to enhance descriptions in their written work.

Superb work from our Cross Country runners who qualified for the Level 3 North Yorkshire School Games County Cross Country Finals which were held at a rather wet and muddy Dalby Forest. Isaac, Freya, Alex and Dylan all qualified through their local Level 2 School Games events, with only the top 8 from each district qualifying from each year group. There was some excellent racing against great runners from across the County. We are very proud of them all. A special mention to Dylan in Year 3 who came first for Richmondshire! Well done everyone!

The whole school went dotty on Friday!! The children and staff were all encouraged to wear something sporty and spotty to raise money for Children in Need. They joined nutrition and fitness expert Joe Wicks via a live weblink to do a workout and we raised £290.80p for this very worthy cause.

Ore-some Copper Belles WI

November was the month of all things chocolate as we were joined once again by Master Chocolatier, Andrew Thwaite. Andrew talked us through the making of chocolate from the bean in the field to the chocolate we buy in the shops. We explored the different processes of the fermentation of the bitter cocoa tree seeds to the cocoa beans which are dried and roasted to the cocoa nibs or cocoa powder and butter extraction. It was interesting to learn about the fair-trade process in the growing and harvesting of the beans and the future sustainability of responsible production. Andrew also introduced some of us to a 'fourth' type of chocolate alongside dark, milk and white. Ruby chocolate was introduced in 2017 by a Belgian–Swiss cocoa company and is produced from ruby cocoa beans. How exactly it is made from these carefully selected beans is top secret, but you might have seen it in our shops last year coating the pink Kit Kats.

As we reminisced about the chocolates and sweets of the past and the changes that have occurred, Andrew shared his thorough knowledge of the great confectionery families/companies of the North. He gave us a great insight into the history of the factories and the people that worked there sharing with us many stories about the chocolate workers and their confectionery
