This of course is a scam and no such outstanding PPI claim exists. Remember the best way to protect yourself against scam telephone calls is to purchase a call blocking device or a new phone with call blocking technology. Alternatively contact your phone provider to discuss what call blocking options they can provide for you.

Sea salt in smaller bags, then in bigger sharing bags (who are they kidding) we are stocking Cheddar and Caramelised Onion Chutney (cheese and onion) and Henderson's Relish, which incidentally have gone down well with a bloke called Henderson. Ooh. Posh up your snacking with crisps made in Yorkshire. Pet.

We stock lots of other goodies made in Yorkshire things too, like Yorkshire beers and ciders, mango chutney, cheeses, ginger biccies, flapjack, lavender linen and room sprays, and oh, I could go on, if I could remember. Come in and peruse and support this lovely county!



# 80th Anniversary of the Death of Spitfire Pilot Flying Officer Peter Pease

Two years ago, Susan Mahaffy began work on a' kneeler' to commemorate Spitfire Pilot Arthur Peter Pease, a hero who lies in the old graveyard of St Michael and All Angels Church.

Peter grew up in Richmond, attended Cambridge University but left suddenly to join 603 Squadron based in Edinburgh, as a Volunteer Reserve Officer in 1940. The Squadron was moved down to Hornchurch, Essex as German air attacks became more concentrated on the South East . On September 15th Peter's Spitfire was in a dog-fight over Kent, taking down his opponent. Sadly Peter was also killed in that fight, at the very height of The Battle of



Britain. His body was brought back home and Peter was buried, with full military honours alongside his grandparents, and in due time joined by his parents and nannie. All lie in the South West corner of Middleton Tyas graveyard.

A commemorative plaque to Peter stands on land outside the graveyard adjacent to the new graveyard, thanks to the kindness shown by the owners of the Estate, to American Professor John Oakley. John had read 'The Last Enemy' by Richard Hillary, fellow Spitfire pilot and friend of Peter's. He had been deeply moved by their heroism and following his first visit to the graveside four years ago, felt strongly that there should be a Memorial Stone to Peter for present and future generations to know of him.

By pure chance Susan encountered John Oakley that day, herself totally ignorant of the life and death of 22 year old Peter, but learning much about him in time.

Two years ago Susan asked for, and was given, permission to place a memorial to Peter within the church. After research on the Spitfire he flew in, she embarked on the stitchery, welcoming invaluable advice from Annie Macdonald an embroidery teacher from Richmond. Susan completed this labour of love very recently in time for the 80th anniversary of his death. The photograph shows the kneeler, a beautiful piece of work that will always serve as a reminder of the sacrifice that Peter and his peers made for us. It is now in situ.

# News from the Parish Council ~

<u>Roadworks on Kneeton Lane</u> – Fred Mence Construction (FMC) are currently using traffic management on Kneeton Lane while they undertake 'sewer works' for the new housing development at 'Copperfield Park'. Planned timescale for this work is for approx 6 weeks from 14 September (say to 24 October).

<u>Housing Development at Copperfield Park</u> - Wynyard Homes have confirmed to us that they will take over legal control of the site (from FMC) on the 21<sup>st</sup> September 2020. They say building work "will shortly commence with the super structures and the sales area being the first target build, that is positioned at the right hand side corner of the site [road side]." You may notice that building work on 8 of the 35 new houses has already commenced and the Project Team will be keeping us informed as work progresses.

<u>Registering of Footpaths and Bridleways of Middleton Tyas on the Definitive Map</u> The Deregulation Act 2015 received royal assent on 26 March 2015. A small but important part of the Act concerns public Rights of Way and will take effect once the regulations and guidance have been completed.

On 1 January 2026, the Government intends to close the definitive maps to the claim of historic paths which existed before 1949 (Section 53 of the Countryside and Rights of Way Act 2000 ((CROW Act)), with the aim of

providing landowners information about what highways exist on their land. It is the job of users to ensure all such routes which are useful, or potentially useful, are claimed before that date.

To this end, if you believe any routes through Middleton Tyas, in existence pre 1949, are not recorded on the Definitive Map and risk being lost as a public Right of Way, please contact Samantha Perks - <u>cllrsamanthaperks@gmail.com</u>

<u>Speed Watch</u> - Your Community Speed Watch Team are resuming their efforts to remind motorists to keep themselves and others safe by following the legal speed limits within our village. PLEASE keep to the speed limits, for all of our sakes! Thank You.

<u>Speed Survey and Vehicle Activated Speed sign (VAS)</u> - Residents may have noticed two black rubber strips running across Middleton Tyas Lane at the end of August. These rubber strips were installed by NYCC at the request of the Parish Council, to conduct a speed survey of traffic travelling in both directions along the road. The results of this will help to determine the need and location of a vehicle-activated speed sign (VAS).

The survey was carried out from 18<sup>th</sup>-24<sup>th</sup> August and showed a total of 7848 vehicles passed through the equipment over 7 days. More than 1100 vehicles passed the point each day:

47% of vehicles travelled below the speed limit of 30mph.

53% of vehicles travelled at speeds of 30mph or higher, with 16% travelling in excess of 35mph. A total of 246 vehicles were travelling at speeds in excess of 40mph, with 7 vehicles travelling in excess of 50mph!

The mean average speed of vehicles across the 7 days was 35.12mph.

Vehicle-activated speed signs are an electronic sign which illuminates when an approaching motor vehicle is travelling in excess of a certain speed. Research has shown that signs placed on 30mph roads can reduce motor vehicle speeds by between 2.6mph and 7.1mph.

The initial concept for a VAS sign was brought forward by Cllr Angus Thompson, that a sign could be purchased, used and rotated between a group of villages to tackle speeding, the logistics of which became complicated and therefore unfeasible. Villages such as Manfield and Gilling West have now sought to purchase their own signs and the Parish Council is looking to do the same for Middleton Tyas. We expect the project to cost in the region of £5000, funds to be raised by a combination of grants, the precept and donations from residents. More information to follow.

<u>Information circulation</u> – The Clerk receives fairly regular notifications from North Yorkshire Police, RDC and NYCC which contain matters of general interest and concern to residents. <u>Next meeting</u> – After having a much appreciated return to meeting in the Memorial Hall on 10<sup>th</sup> September – and many thanks to the Management Committee for working hard to make that possible - it looks like we will be back to Zoom for our next meeting on Thursday, 8<sup>th</sup> October at 7.00 pm, unless rules on groups meeting are relaxed before then. garages, outbuildings), the building itself (locks, spare keys, alarms) and its contents (keys, timed lighting and high-value items) specifically, installing good security measures and making sure we use them. This approach can be applied to every type of building including garages and sheds. Some experts say that the overall impression of the home will influence whether it is targeted and as a general rule, if it looks like there is someone inside, the potential burglar is more likely to go elsewhere. # Flu vaccinations 2020

Flu vaccinations will only be given by appointment this year.

The Department of Health are recommending that we offer flu vaccinations FREE OF CHARGE to all of our patients in the following groups: those will be aged 65 before 31<sup>st</sup> March 2021, those who suffer from Asthma, COPD, Diabetes, Stroke, Ischaemic Heart Disease, patients with low immunity, pregnant patients, patients who are carers, patients with a BMI over 40, and those who are shielded.

Due to restrictions as a result of COVD-19, we plan to vaccinate our patients as follows:

<u>Those over 65 on the 31<sup>st</sup> March 2021</u>: will be invited to attend the drive-through clinic at Middleton Lodge on the 30<sup>th</sup> September 2020. *You will be given a specific time slot to attend via a letter.* Please follow the instructions on the letter.

<u>Children (Aged 2 to 10 years on the 31<sup>st</sup> August 2020)</u>: older children will receive their vaccine (via nasal spray) at school. For 2-3 year-olds, we will contact you directly to book an appointment.

In addition, in response to COVID-19, the NHS also wants to reduce the chances of those who are vulnerable to this new virus from getting flu, therefore, in addition to those who would usually be eligible, the vaccine will also be offered to the following groups:

Those living in close proximity to a patient who is shielded: It is better if you have this vaccine sooner rather than later, but we are unlikely to have enough in the surgery to give you one (we had to order our vaccines a year ago, and have not been able to increase our order). We encourage you to get this vaccine free of charge at a supermarket or local pharmacy – please make it clear that you live with a patient who is shielded.

**Those aged between 50 and 64:** these vaccines will not be available until November or December 2020 at the earliest, and only if supplies are sufficient nationally. Please follow national media, and our practice website, for updates. Please do not ring the surgery to ask about this.

Please contact the Surgery if you do not wish to have the flu vaccination so we can update our records and this will stop further invites for this year's campaign.

# **ORE-SOME COPPER BELLES WI**

For our September meeting, we were delighted to welcome a long-time acquaintance of Pauline's, Dr Christine Maddern, and her hearing dog, Freddie, to tell us all about the charity, Hearing Dogs for Deaf People. It has been shown that having a hearing dog reduces the sense of isolation and brings feelings of independence, confidence and companionship to the deaf person. Hearing dogs are trained to alert their owner to the sounds of door bells, alarm clocks and smoke alarms etc. W.I. is not yet meeting at the Memorial Hall, so when the charity got in touch to say they were offering virtual talks on Zoom, we seized the opportunity!

Pauline first got to know Christine whilst working in the Audiology department at the Friarage hospital. Christine explained how she started losing her hearing at the age of five, and in later life, losing most of her residual hearing. She explained just how much having her own hearing dog has changed her life. Hearing Dogs for the Deaf relies on volunteers to help care for and to train puppies. The downside of a Zoom meeting was that we didn't have the opportunity of meeting Freddie "in person". Freddie is an adorable, loveable black poodle who sat on the chair next to Christine, yet it wasn't long before he was curled up fast asleep - but always maintaining a listening watch for his owner. It was an inspirational talk on such an important topic which was very much enjoyed by our members.

Ore-some Copper Belles have also continued to be busy with other charitable activities over the last month. Our talented ladies knitted/crocheted 11 baby blankets which were sent off to the Stillbirth And Neonatal Death charity (SANDS) to support families. Last week, they also met with ClIr Jim Clark, the chairman of North Yorkshire County Council, who visited to thank us for the voluntary time spend litter picking locally. You may recall pre Covid he was to join us on the Saturday in March for our organised WI litter pick but unfortunately our WI initiative had to be cancelled due to Lockdown. In true WI style, this did not deter our members though and many used the opportunity of our daily hour walk to carry out individual litter picks. ClIr Jim Clark extends his thanks to Ore-some Cooper Belles for the fabulous efforts made. A big thanks also goes to Joss and Clare for coordinating these initiatives.
