Birdlife Survey and Footpaths.

As we are heading into another lockdown it seems timely to mention that Stuart Harrison and the team at Murkey Hill are working hard to create a habitat that is conducive to success of all birdlife. As well as many game and wildfowl species, the farm is lucky to have a small number of the native and increasingly rare English Partridge (we have one covey this year of 22!), together with many other rare species including Oystercatchers, Lapwing and Curlew.

Nationally these species are declining in number and key to their success is providing safe habitat. In a recent bird survey on the farm an amazing 59 bird species were recorded of which 20% were "red" listed and 18% "amber" listed. Disturbance due to dogs hunting in fields, hedgerows and wildlife corridors can make the difference between success and failure for these species.

New signs have been erected on the footpath between the Church and Murkey Hill because in the past few months there have been an increase in the number of instances where dogs have been seen running out of control through the covers and woods chasing and killing birds. It may not be obvious to all, but a huge effort is made to create safe habitat and these occurrences sadly undermine all that hard work.

The footpaths are an excellent resource for the village but can we respectfully ask you to ensure that walkers remain on the footpath and follow the Countryside Code which requires their dogs to be under very close control or on the lead please. (https://www.gov.uk/government/publications/the-countryside-code)

We started the year with our Crime Prevention Event in the Memorial Hall and sadly are ending it with Coronavirus upon us once again. As we do more online, we have seen an increase in cybercrime including

hacking, scams and identity theft.

To try to stay 3 steps ahead it is recommended we create a different password for our email address(es), use 3 random words and use twofactor authentication (2FA). Our email accounts online shopping so a strong password that is different to our other accounts is key. It is recommended that we use 3 random words to generate passwords as it is very difficult for a computer algorithm to crack.

The Police Digital Security Centre suggests looking around the room and picking three things we see, eg, tablecomputermap, words easily associated with us such as family or pet names which would be easy to identify if we use social media. It is suggested we replace old passwords with new ones, email then banking then social media. To increase password strength we can extend our 3 words with numbers, capitals and characters and still keep it memorable. Two-factor authentication (2FA) reduces the risk of being hacked by asking us to provide a second factor of information such as a text or code when we log in.

Christmas is a favourite time for scammers to send fraudulent emails, texts, messages and fraudulent offers on social media. Get Safe Online have these safety tips:

Carefully checking website addresses are spelt correctly as fake websites can be very similar. Ideally, type it in rather than clicking on a link.

When paying, make sure the page is secure by checking that addresses begin with 'https' ('s' is for secure) and there's a closed padlock in the address bar. Remember that whilst the page is secure, the site itself could be fraudulent.

Many items such as gifts, holidays and events. on social media and online forums are genuine but others are fraudulent. Be extra vigilant to check authenticity.

Avoid 'free' or 'low-cost' trials without thoroughly reading the small print and trusted reviews. Signing up for monthly direct debits could be very hard to cancel.

♦ If a winter holiday or short break is on the cards, check that what we're booking online is genuine by doing thorough research, looking for independent reviews and check their ABTA/ATOL membership number.

Pay by credit card for extra protection. Don't pay for anything by transferring money directly to unknown people or companies. If it's a fraud, it's doubtful the bank will be able to recover or refund our money.

Fake parcel firm delivery notifications are commonplace attachments or links, as are emails and other messages featuring 'special offers' and 'prizes'. Fraudsters may spoof a genuine email address or change the 'display name' to make it appear genuine. We are advised:

- 🔶 do not click on any links in emails, texts or posts
- do not disclose any personal or financial information
- do not open unexpected email attachments
- do not reply to fraudulent messages
- do not call unknown telephone numbers

Action Fraud is warning people to look out for fake PayPal are the gateway to our banking, social media and emails. In Jan-Sept 2020, there were 21,349 crime reports made to Action Fraud re fake PayPal emails with victims losing £7,891,077.44. These reports made up a third of online shopping and auction fraud. Sellers received emails that appeared to be from PayPal, stating payment had been made so prompting the seller to dispatch. They rely on the seller not verifying the payment in their PayPal account. Be aware of warning signs such as a negative feedback or a recently set up account to avoid poor feedback, and do not send anything until payment is verified. PayPal emails never ask for password or financial details.

> HMRC is aware of a number of scams; HMRC financial support as a result of coronavirus, 'goodwill payment' scam is a phishing campaign telling customers they can claim a tax refund to help protect themselves from the coronavirus outbreak, '£250 fine' for leaving the house more than once and asks us to call an 0800 telephone number to appeal, 'Google Play' fraudulent call claiming outstanding taxes to pay by purchasing google play cards. HMRC will never send notifications by email about tax rebates or refunds. If we receive a text, email or call claiming to be from HMRC then it is a scam and they ask that we forward text messages to 60599 (network charges apply) and emails to phishing@hmrc.gov.uk.

Local Authorities are warning of a Government Small Business Grants scam. Businesses receive fake emails stating a cash grant application has been processed and includes a link to a request for an advance fee to receive payment or to capture bank and card details.

Covid-19 scams and crimes, key protection advice, guidance and reporting is on the Crimestoppers website covidfraudhotline.org. Their COVID Fraud Hotline is open 24/7, 365 days a year on 0800 587 5030.

If we think we may have been a victim of fraud, we are to report it to Action Fraud online at actionfraud.police.uk or by calling 0300 123 2040. If we have an email we're not sure about, we can forward it to report@phishing.gov.uk.

To contact our local Police, we can email them at generalenquiries@northyorkshire.pnn.police.uk or telephone 101 to report a suspicious incident or 999 if we believe a crime is taking place.

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From your County Councillor

The prospect of Devolution has been discussed at length for years with all sorts of proposals having been put forwards. East Yorkshire joining North Yorkshire and so on, but as David Cameron put it so succinctly, the problem in Yorkshire is that people from one end of the County don't like the people from the other end.

I'm not a Yorkshireman, so I've no axe to grind. I have lived and worked here for nearly forty years and it is a County I love, together with the people.

The latest proposal put forward to Government is for a devolved Assembly of North Yorkshire and the City of York. This was accepted by Government, provided that proposals for a Unitary(s) Council are brought to the table at the same time.

Devolution is something which we in our locality desperately need. Look at the success Ben Houchen has had in Teesside. Many projects have had considerable funding from Government. His business model sits well in Westminster where as ours does not. Why not follow suit and get funding for all sorts of projects as he has? So, there have been two proposals for Unitary brought forwards. One from the County Council and one from the District Councils. Both have been submitted to Government in draft form, the final submission to be by 9th December.

The County Council proposal is for one Unitary Council to be based in Northallerton and covering the existing NYCC footprint. All services offered by both the County and District Councils will be handled by one new authority. The monitory savings are estimated to be £30 million in year one and £255 million over five years. One major concern which has been expressed by many to me over the proposed 'super unitary' is that backwaters in Richmondshire will be totally neglected. To this I say that given the proposal to not only maintain the 6 Area Constituency Committees but give them increased authority especially in respect of financial spending should ensure that this isn't the case.

Also, in my view if there is neglect of rural areas then the electorate have the ballot box if their elected representative is underperforming.

The District Councils favour 2 Unitary Councils, one based in Northallerton covering Richmondshire, Hambleton, Craven and Harrogate district councils, and the other being based in York covering Scarborough, Ryedale, Selby and the City of York. The biggest stumbling block to this proposal is that the current City of York Council are diametrically opposed to this plan. They voted 41 to 2 to reject it. Arranged marriages rarely work so I'm told? Hambleton District Council have also voted to reject this submission. Whilst I can to an extent understand the thought process behind leave things as they are, we are managing nicely, the present arrangements for local government are broken in North Yorkshire as they are financially hugely inefficient clearly demonstrates. Why do we need 8 Chief Executives of Councils, 8 Section 151 Officers (chief accountants) etc. when one will do as has been clearly demonstrated in other Authorities?

The entire process of moving to Unitary is about saving money. The present system of having a District Council and a County Council is very inefficient and expensive to run. Those who say to me 'can't we just leave things alone and carry on as we are?' are living in Alice in Wonderland. The answer in cash rich in Hambleton District Council is yes perhaps. However the other District Councils especially Richmondshire, and NYCC will be 'out of money' in possibly 3 years if no corrective action is taken. The change to Unitary will go a long way to solving the problem.

The question of course is which proposal to go for. One Unitary or two?

The two proposals have been submitted to the Minister in draft form with the final submissions to be in by the 9th December. These will be considered in London and put out to consultation with the electorate. This is very different to 1974 when Government simply imposed reorganisation without consultation.

The County Council elections due to be held next May will take place if no Devolution proposal and Unitary are accepted, but if we are to go down the Unitary route, they will be deferred for a year.

Best wishes to everyone for Christmas. Please keep safe! And let's look forward to 2021 when things surely will get better.

School News from Helen Richardson

Autumn has certainly arrived in style and the Reception children over at our Eppleby site have been busy collecting leaves to make a work of art based on the story 'Leaf Man.' The children have also been learning about Guy Fawkes and the Gunpowder Plot and have used powder paints to create a firework display outside. Our Pre-school children have been learning about Remembrance Day and have made some wonderful poppies which are displayed on the railings.

Year 1 have also been learning about the Gunpowder Plot and why we celebrate bonfire night. They have even acted out the Plot! The children have also been discussing what it mean to 'belong' and where they feel they belong. In Year 2 the children have been learning about Martin Luther King as part of Black History month. They have also been busy scientists looking at different materials and how they can change shape.

Over in Year 3 the children are becoming budding authors and have been busy writing stories and poems and have used their ICT skills to improve their typing!

The children in Year 4 have been getting to grips with tricky maths problems using four figure digits and they have begun investigating measurements and the relationship between millimetres, centimetres and kilometres.

In Year 5 the class has been busy interpreting the data on bar charts and line graphs. The children have continued with their topic of World War 2 and have discovered what the term 'Blitz' means and how rationing was introduced and why.

Year 6 have been looking at D Day and what made it a success and they have also had a lively debate about evacuation and the reasons for and against this. In science, the children have also been investigating different muscle groups and have devised some workout routines to target each group.

Talking of giving our muscles a very good workout, we were delighted to welcome a 'Drumba' team to our Middleton Tyas site last week. All the children and staff joined in the workshops which involved doing Zumba moves combined with some very energetic drumming, jumping and shouting! We certainly got all our muscles working and our hearts pumping and everyone agreed it was a fabulous and fun way to exercise.



Staying with our keeping fit and healthy theme, we have a whole school challenge to 'Journey to the North Pole'. Each week we will calculate the distance each class has 'travelled' by using figures from our daily mile and the Key Stage 2 MOKI step trackers. We are aiming to walk the equivalent distance (as the crow flies) from Middleton Tyas to the North Pole by Christmas! We have got off to a flying start and averaged 943km in the first week!

CHILDREN'S SOCIETY

Dear All, as usual I will be collecting Children's Society boxes in January. This year , more than ever, it has been hard for young homeless people to make contact with family members, to try to make a go of things. ORE-SOME COPPER BELLES WI

November's meeting was learning about why we should talk about poo! A topic that normally would feature in conversations with my children and certainly not something I thought I'd be writing about in our WI article. But, following our amazing talk by Viv Pow, I learned that 'poo' is a very important topic for us adults also and talking about poo can save lives. The link here is to bowel cancer.

Viv is a survivor of bowel cancer and is spreading the word to help others. Although bowel cancer is the second biggest cancer killer in the UK, it is one of the most preventable types of cancer and, if caught early enough, it is treatable too. Recognising the signs and symptoms is key which can include changes in your normal bowel habit and your poo. Often, though, people are too embarrassed to talk about these sorts of things so they don't visit the doctors until it is too late. The message, therefore, is to take action immediately. This could be talking to a friend about your concerns, going to the doctors or simply just ensuring you complete the prevention and screening test that is provided for everyone once over 55.

Listening to Viv and her story was an inspiration. What she called her 'inner smile' was certainly spread to us and it was lovely to know that there is a fantastic, supportive group of Oresome Belles that are there if ever needed!
