The Action Fraud National Fraud & Cyber Crime Reporting Centre have alerted the Neighbourhood Watch to criminals exploiting the COVID-19 pandemic to try and get their hands on our money and personal information. As at mid June 2020, Action Fraud had received reports from 2,378 victims of Coronavirus-related scams, with total losses reaching over £7 million.



Here are some simple steps they suggest we can take that will protect us from the most common Coronavirus-related scams:

- 1 - Watch out for scam messages - Your bank, or other official organisations, won't ask you to share personal information over email or text. If you receive an email you're not quite sure about, forward it to the Suspicious Email Reporting Service (SERS): report@phishing.gov.uk
- 2 - Shopping online - If you're making a purchase from a company or person you don't know and trust, carry out some research first, for example, by checking to see if others have used the site and what their experience was. If you decide to go ahead with the purchase, use a credit card if you have one, other payment providers may not provide the same protection.
- 3 - Unsolicited calls and browser pop-ups offering tech support - Never install any software, or grant remote access to your computer, as a result of a cold call. Remember, legitimate organisations would never contact you out of the blue to ask for financial details such as your PIN or full banking password.

NHS Test and Trace scams - Contact tracers will only call you from the number 0300 013 5000. Anyone who does not wish to talk over the phone can request the NHS Test and Trace service to send an email or text instead, inviting them to log into the web-based service. All text or emails sent by NHS Test and Trace will ask people to sign into the contact tracing website and will provide you with a unique reference number. Action Fraud advises us to type the web address directly into their browser, followed by the unique reference number we're given, rather than clicking on any link provided in the message.

The NHS Test and Trace service will never:

- ❖ ask you to dial a premium rate number to speak to them (for example, those starting 09 or 087)
- ❖ ask you to make any form of payment or purchase a product or any kind
- ❖ ask for any details about your bank account
- ❖ ask for your social media identities or login details, or those of your contacts
- ❖ ask you for any passwords or PINs, or ask you to set up any passwords or PINs over the phone
- ❖ ask you to access any website that does not belong to the government or NHS
- ❖ ask you to download any software to your PC or ask you to hand over control of your PC, smartphone or tablet to anyone else

North Yorkshire Police, via their Community Messaging system, have also advised that they have seen the first phishing email relating to the Test & Trace service. Notably, the fake email refers to the service as 'track and trace'. The email advises the recipient that they have been exposed to someone who has tested positive for coronavirus. They are instructed to click on a link in order to find out who that person is and are warned that if they fail to do so within 24 hours, legal action may be taken. The email address from which this message is sent is alert@nhs-trackandtrace233-gov.com. Please also be aware that some people have also been contacted by someone claiming to be from the Test and Trace service then asking for £500 for a test to be administered. Please remember that tracers will only ever contact a person by phone and NEVER in person and that the service is free.

North Yorkshire Police have seen a rise in "number spoofing" which is a method by which fraudsters use easily accessible software to make any number they dial from appear on the recipient's phone as any number they choose. Such examples of spoofed calls they have had reported are individuals claiming to be from the victim's bank informing them their account has been compromised and they need to transfer funds, or a call claiming to be from the Police or HMRC informing them there is an outstanding tax bill and a warrant has been issued for that person's arrest. Often these types of calls can be used to gain personal information such as account logon details, PIN numbers and passwords. It is important that we are aware of this type of fraud and there are some simple steps we can take to protect ourselves.

Don't assume just because the number displayed looks like our bank or other official organisation, that it is them calling. The advice is if we have any doubt whatsoever then we are to terminate the call and using another phone, call the organisation in question. For example if our 'bank' contacts us on our mobile and

we are suspicious, we are to terminate the call, and using the phone number on our statement or Customer Services number listed on the bank's website, call them back on our landline. Fraudsters will often tell us to call your bank to check if the call is genuine but will not clear the line so when we call our bank we would in fact still be speaking to the fraudsters. Ask the caller for their name and a way to verify they are an employee of the place they are calling from.

For instance a first name and a staff ID, or a first and surname. Any employee of a legitimate company will be willing to provide these details, if the caller refuses or becomes confrontational be very suspicious. It is very easy for fraudsters to fake a contact telephone number, it is very unlikely they will have accurate staff names and details. If the caller claims to be from the police, ask for the officer's 'collar number' and then call the police back using a different phone. If the caller is genuine they will not mind you checking their identity. Remember:

- ❖ - Your bank will NEVER ask you to move money to a safe account.
- ❖ - Your bank will NEVER tell you about staff members who are under suspicion of investigation of fraud.
- ❖ - The police will NEVER ask you to pay a fine over the phone

If the caller is asking you to pay a fine, transfer money or verify personal information – STOP and terminate the call. This is most definitely a fraud and needs to be reported to the police on 101. You can purchase a call blocking device or a new phone with a built in call blocking if you would like or you could contact your phone provider to discuss what call blocking services they offer. If you ever feel worried that a call, email or text is not from the person it claims to be from then delete it or terminate the call immediately and call the police on 101. If you would like to receive up to date information directly to your email address then please do sign up to North Yorkshire Community Messaging (NYCM) which is managed by North Yorkshire Police. The official website is www.nycm.co.uk which will allow you to sign into your account to change your delivery method preference or locations of interest. It also contains a FAQs section, which may assist with any queries you have. North Yorkshire Police will only ever link you to secure web-sites they trust and only send you attachments where they believe it is absolutely necessary.

If you think you have been a victim of fraud, please report it to Action Fraud at www.actionfraud.police.uk or by calling 0300 123 2040. Please continue to report suspicious incidents through 101 but if you believe a crime is taking place call 999 immediately. And finally a new phishing campaign has emerged claiming to offer recipients the chance to win a £1,000 Amazon gift card. The subject reads: "On the occasion of overcoming the coronavirus, Amazon gives you the gift of victory." The sender name is spoofed to read 'contact@amazon.com'. The recipient is instructed to click on a link in order to apply. The link has been identified as malware. It is common for such scams offering free vouchers to ask for a person's bank details.

Remember, trust your instincts and if it sounds too good to be true, it is!!!

(I can vouch for the bank scam – it happened to us. My husband phoned the bank after becoming suspicious of a call, to be told the scammers were trying to rob him as they spoke. A lucky escape – **EDITOR**)

News from the Parish Council

Some residents may have missed our news in the **June edition**, although it was included in the digital version on our village website. Here is what you missed...

Another 30-ish days ticked off the calendar and we are still in lockdown, albeit with relaxation of some regulations since 13 May. Some of you may have returned to work and this includes our Handyman, Mike Ramsey, who is back keeping the village neat and tidy. A public note of appreciation to Mike for all the work he does in his usual cheerful and helpful manner. The Village Shop is still open and well stocked, delivering to those who cannot get out and about. Please give them your support.

The Children's Play Park is still closed until further notice. **The Playing Field** remains open for your 'as much as you like' daily exercise – please continue to respect social distancing at all times. The conditions

around use of the playing field say that it must be retained and protected for use as 'a community leisure facility' at all times. However, there has been a suggestion that the School may find it helpful to have access to this large green space during the early transition months of getting fully open again. Under the School's requirement to comply with child protection legislation, this would mean that during any times when the school was given access to the playing field, it would be necessary for the playing field to be closed to the public. This could be for specific hours during term-time weeks (i.e. play times, after lunch) and the restricted hours would be clearly posted at the field entrance gates. If any resident has a view about this temporary change of use conditions, either for or against, please contact the Parish Clerk (clerk.mtyas@live.co.uk, 377062) as soon as possible to enable the Parish Council to make a decision. Your comments will be confidential. It is your playing field but, in these unusual circumstances, it would be good to offer to help the School in this way.

The 'Best Kept Village Comp 2020' has been cancelled. Notwithstanding that bit of news, we would like to thank you for helping with the following...

-- Please remember to cut back your own shrubs and trees which overhang the public footpath, or NYCC will be asked to do it, and they will charge you!

-- Please do not drive, park or store goods on any grass verges, or on the village Green (which has legal protection). It costs 20% of our budget to have them cut and any damage just costs us (i.e. you) more, and looks unsightly.

-- Someone has been throwing several dog poo bags into a private garden (why would you?!). Please be thoughtful and responsible and take all your litter home or dispose of it in any of the waste bins provided around the village, which most of you do.

And last but not least a message from our Chairman, Cllr Gordon Davies -

• **The Village Shop** – to Helen and all the volunteers in keeping us all going, obtaining scarce supplies that the supermarkets ran out of, providing call and collect groceries and a delivery service for the vulnerable and self isolating. Thank you.

The Parish Council makes history! The Parish Council held its first ever virtual meeting on the 11th June 2020 via the powers of Zoom. The Coronavirus Act 2020 received Royal Assent on 27 March. It gave power for the Secretary of State to make regulations for the holding of remote meetings for local authorities. The Regulations are now published and came into force on 4th April 2020 for a specified period of time until May next year. The meeting proceeded without any technical glitches and some of our furry friends wanted a piece of the camera action too! At the meeting our Chairman for the last two years, Councillor Gordon Davies, resigned and Councillor Samantha Perks was elected to be the incoming Chairman. Gordon has been instrumental in setting up the Community Speed Watch scheme and taking the lead for the Play Park refurbishment project. We thank Gordon for all of his hard work and dedication. Gordon is gladly staying with the Parish Council in his new role as Vice-chairman. The Council will continue to convene via Zoom until the Village Hall re-opens.
