Best Kept Village Competition 2021

Richmond Rotary have now sent us their Judges' Guidelines for the competition and they will be inspecting the village during the first 2 weeks of July. If you could help by tidying outside your own property by the end of June, that would be brilliant. *Thank you!*

There are 16 villages taking part this year and, in summary, the Judges are asked to look at:

- Condition of Village Green, Village Centre and/or Main Streets.
- o Absence of litter.
- Condition of hedges, fences and walls, especially those adjacent to and surrounding buildings and gardens. (*We scored quite badly in this category last year!*)
- Condition of Churchyards and Burial Grounds.
- Condition of flower and vegetable gardens.
- Appearance of garages, outbuildings and sheds.
- Condition of Industrial Estates (in the Town) and Farmyards (tidy with no scrap).
- Cleanliness and absence of rubbish in ponds and streams flowing through or by the village.
- Condition of Community Buildings, other public buildings and War Memorials and surrounding areas.
- Condition and cleanliness of bus shelters and surrounding areas. (We don't have one.)
- Cleanliness of telephone kiosks and surrounding areas. (We don't have one.)
- Appearance of Post Office and/or Shops. (We always do well here!)
- Appearance of Inns/Public Houses/Guest Houses.
- Condition and situation of seats.
- Condition of Notice boards and display of public notices.
- Display of tubs and hanging baskets at private houses, public houses, etc.
- Encouragement of wildlife (bird feeders, bird baths, wood piles for hedgehogs, etc).

Judges are told that "Certain villages/towns have a natural charm and beauty but are not necessarily of the highest standard. So far as possible you have to judge the effort made by communities to keep their village/town as clean and attractive as possible in all respects".

School News from Helen Richardson

Despite what the weather might be telling us, Spring has definitely arrived in pre-school and Reception when the children were visited by some chicks and lambs! It was a fabulous learning opportunity for the children, who thoroughly enjoyed stroking and asking questions about the animals. Staying with animals, the children are excitedly watching our caterpillars to see the transformation they go through to become beautiful butterflies! The children also became chefs, making porridge and red velvet cupcakes which linked to their class stories of 'Goldilocks and the 3 Bears' and 'Little Red Riding Hood.'

Year 1 have become excellent detectives and have followed the first clue to find out what has become of the Queen's missing bag and hat! They have thought of some very interesting predictions and are eagerly awaiting the next instalment of this fantastic class story. Debate has been raging in the classroom with the children discussing whether the wind is good or bad and they put forward some very convincing arguments both for and against the wind. The children have also been looking at animal habitats and are now busy designing some of their own.

Year 2 have had another busy week, enjoying their DRUMBA sessions and making the most of the sunshine to play golf as part of their PE lesson. The children have also been measuring using centimetres and metres as well as using positional and directional language to program the BeeBots to find Paddington Bear! The children have also designed some pet habitats, thinking about what they need to provide to keep the pets safe, warm and comfortable.

Over in **Year 3** the children have continued learning about fractions in Maths. They have also become budding authors by planning and writing news reports based on their class novel 'Song of the Dolphin Boy.' They also had a fabulous time in their new DRUMBA session. The children have been Eco warriors and have written persuasive letters to climate activist Greta Thunberg which links to their topic of recycling.

As part of their Science lesson, Year 4 have planted some bean seeds. They are going to watch to see if they grow and how different conditions such as no light or not watering them might affect them. More updates on this interesting experiment will follow! The children have been tackling the tricky issue of telling the time on a digital and analogue clock. They just need a little bit more 'time' to do this! The children have also been looking at the Christian value of 'Friendship' and have written some lovely poems which have been put into a book in the classroom for all the children to enjoy.

Year 5 have been very excited about beginning their new Minecraft Education sessions in Science and Computing. They have also been looking at different mountain ranges around the world and how mountains are formed and have been investigating the relationship between elephants and humans! The children have been busy planning and creating comic strips retelling the story of the eruption of Mount Vesuvius and its destruction of Pompeii. They are also very excited about researching catapult designs in preparation for making their own! Meanwhile Year 6 have been continuing their topic of Ancient Greece and have excitedly begun looking at their end of term production 'Go For Gold' which ties in beautifully with their topic. The children have been putting their knowledge of formal writing into practice and have written some wonderful reports based on the class text 'Who Let The Gods Out?' They are also eagerly awaiting to go on their class residential trip to Robin Wood, a great opportunity for them to spend some quality time away with their friends, team building, sharing, working together to problem solve and to generally have a fantastic 3 days away!

This is the money that covers the expenses of running the church other than maintenance of the building.

Heat, light and insurance are expenses you would expect but we also contribute to the running of our local group of churches together with our Quota payable to the Diocese who oversee our churches from Leeds. These are over £12,000.00 a year and help pay the clergy, their pensions and accommodation, even when we don't have a vicar of our own !

Anyway, our finances were in pretty good order before the crisis and none of us should expect to make up that loss immediately and things are already picking up with more weddings and increased attendances at our services.
