Garden Bonfires – Current Advice – Please be thoughtful!

During the pandemic, Councils around the country have asked residents to reconsider the need to have a bonfire during this time due to the effects that smoke and particulates can have on those who are vulnerable. Advice was issued to residents by RDC in May 2020 and they hoped that people would take heed and consider their neighbours. They wanted to highlight the potential issue at the start of the pandemic, especially as at that time recycling centres were closed. Although it's not illegal to have a bonfire to burn garden waste which is grown on the land, smoke produced could be deemed a 'statutory nuisance' under the Environmental Protection Act 1990, depending on times and frequency of fires. The decision lies with the individual as to whether they choose to have

a bonfire. We would refer residents to the leaflet 'Bonfires' which is available direct from RDC (01748 829100) or can be emailed to you on request (clerk.mtyas@live.co.uk . Thank you.

Overhanging branches

The latest figures from the Police National Computer indicate car crime decreased during Covid-19 restrictions

but we could now see a surge in car crime with the easing of lockdown. The Neighbourhood Watch Network is launching a "Protect Your Car" campaign, asking us to protect our cars by always leaving them **Locked**, Lit and **Empty**.

There is a misconception that cars are now auto-locking or lock themselves if left unattended after a period of time which isn't always the case so best to lock our cars ourselves rather than assume they will lock themselves. As most car crime occurs during the evening or at night, parking near good lighting and remembering to remove personal items to make sure no items are left on show can help deter thieves too.

Letters to the Editor

Motorway noise level compensation claims.

Currently there are a number of compensation claims submitted to the Highways authority arising from the increased noise from the motorway.

• The District Valuer has been appointed to negotiate on behalf of the Authority. The cut off point in the village seems to be at the pub and he suggests properties may have depreciated in value by about 1%.

• I know the two Land Agents are acting on behalf of clients making claims.

• Some clients may not realise that the fees of any agent instructed are covered by the Highways Authority.

• The land compensation act 1973 ...which allows claims to be made also confirms as follows....

"In addition to compensation any expenses incurred in the preparation and prosecution of a claim will be paid by the highways authority."

• I have seen a copy of a contract with one agent which requires a payment of 10% of the compensation.

• In other words the agent is seeking to to be paid twice but has not told the client.

• In view of the lack of disclosure it may be an unfair contract term and arguably not enforceable?

Telephone Box

We have received notice through Richmondshire District Council that BT intend to remove the public telephone unless reasons are given to justify that it remains. When this was proposed some years ago, we were able to retain the facility due to the fact that we have a poor mobile signal in the village and in a medical emergency, to access the defibrillator (located in the Black Bull car park if you are not aware), the public phone could be vital. Please contact the Chairman of the Parish Meeting (moultonparishmeting@yahoo.co.uk) if you wish to support keeping the telephone. Once it has gone, it will not be replaced.

Highways Maintenance

The broken chevrons at the top of Scurragh House Lane have been reported and will be repaired. The damaged "Public Bridleway" sign on Hall Road has been repaired and shortened. It will be replaced in due course. The broken telephone pole opposite the Black Bull has been replaced and for health and safety reasons, due to the proximity of the electricity pole, has been placed on the verge outside the Inn.

Postal delays

Following the delays and absence of postal deliveries earlier this year, our MP Rishi Sunak was contacted and he in turn contacted the Chief Executive at Royal Mail. An explanation was received from the Senior Public Relations Manager that gave reasons as bad weather and coronavirus related sickness.
