KEY RING FUNDRAISER FOR LOCAL CANCER SUPPORT

Nearly everyone I speak to now has been touched by Cancer in some way; either personally or a family member or a friend.

If they live locally most probably they have been treated by the cancer units at James Cook University Hospital Middlesbrough or The Friarage Hospital Northallerton, or both.

I would like to raise some money to support them. I have a small hobby business making items from Harris Tweed. I am offering Key Rings, each with an authentication badge attached.

"Harris Tweed is one of the most desirable wool textiles in the world. It is produced in the Outer Hebrides, on the one island with two names, separated only by a mountain range- the island of Lewis and Harris. All Harris Tweed must be, by law, hand woven on a treadle loom by the weaver at his own home. Harris Tweed weavers throughout Lewis and Harris are self employed craftsmen and women, often having learnt the craft from their forefathers over many years. The Harris Tweed Authority issues each tweed with a certification mark - the ORB MARK."

I buy my tweed direct from a weaver on the Isle of Lewis. He is totally on board with my project, so much so that he has provided me with a large number of the authentication badges so that I can sew one on to each

key ring.

The key rings are priced at £3 each or 4 for £10. The are on sale in the Village Shop or can be purchased direct from me.

FROM THE PARISH COUNCIL ~

Double Yellow Lines

The new traffic markings running from Scotch Corner down into Middleton Tyas Lane have been installed recently following a full public consultation by North Yorkshire County Council. They will hopefully protect this part of the village from careless (and sometimes long term) parking which was making the road dangerous in this busy area. Please note that the new <u>parking prohibition</u> covers not only <u>the road</u>, but also the pavement and the grass verges within the marked areas.

The Highway Code explains that double yellow lines "indicate a prohibition of waiting at any time even if there are no upright signs". If signage is not in place that permits stopping on double yellow lines at certain times, then motorists are prohibited from stopping 24 hours per day, 7 days per week which includes Sundays and public holidays. Waiting restrictions indicated by yellow lines apply to the carriageway, pavement and verge. You may stop to load or unload on the road (unless there are also loading restrictions as described below) or while passengers board or alight, providing you do not cause an obstruction.

Defibrillator - VETS

The Voluntary Emergency Telephone Service (VETS), linked to use of the Defibrillator, is proving no longer to be viable due to lack of volunteers. As the village already has a well-supported First Responder scheme, it has been decided to cancel the VETS scheme – please dispose of your fridge magnets and key fobs, if you have them. The First Responder scheme will be supported by annual training in the use of the Defibrillator. If you missed the training session held on 16th October, you will be invited to join a session next year.

Vehicle Activated Speed Sign – VAS

A VAS will be installed on the grass verge adjacent to West Close on Friday 5th November. Please drive safely throughout the village, observing all speed signs, particularly in the 20mph zone or near the School.

Play Park Refurbishment

The first piece of new equipment for the Play Park – a climbing net - will be installed during the first week of December, weather dependent. The Play Park will be closed while contractors are on site.

Anyone have any memories of "Miss Annie Brook (around 1904), George, who had married Elizabeth Scott in 1900, her parents, John Scott and Mary, nee Ridley (born at Melsonby and Aldbrough respectively), the Scott family living at Barton in the 1901 census and in 1911 at Middleton Tyas - possibly living or working at Middleton Lodge (photo of them at the Gatehouse). One of the family in the 1901/11 censuses, Lily, appears to have married a George Munday and been resident at School Bank in the village when she died in 1972." News from Neighbourhood Watch



Our local Police Community Support Officer Connor Mattison is based at Richmond Police Station. His collar number is 3651 and if you wish to contact him you should dial 101, press option 2 and ask for him by his full name or collar number.

As we have reported in recent months the good news is that crime around Richmond has been relatively low and the chances of being a victim of burglary are still very low in Richmondshire generally. There have however been the following

Poaching

There is historically an increase in poaching activity at this time of the year as a result of harvesting and the onset of darker evenings making access to farmland easier. In order to combat this the Police have been working with landowners in terms of offering target hardening advice and carrying out patrols with our border watch partners.

Poaching has a detrimental effect on both the local rural community and the wildlife within the area, and there are also welfare issues with regard to the dogs used by those responsible.

Anyone witnessing poaching should obtain as much information as possible including details of vehicles and descriptions of persons involved without compromising their own safety and report the incident to the police.

Bilsdale TV Mast Scam

Carys Samuel, a communications manager with North Yorkshire police has sent the following:

We've been made aware that fraudsters are posing as TV engineers and offering to help local residents retune their TV's following the Bilsdale mast fire for a fee of £200. We've been advised that this is not legitimate activity and advise you not to accept unsolicited offers of help. If anyone knocks on your door to offer this service, do not let them into your home and do not give them any money.

If anyone approaches you at your home and you are concerned, do not let them in and call the police on 101 to report this.

Please share this message with friends, family and networks who may not use social media or be part of online networks and help us to keep everyone safe from these scammers.

Ore-some Copper Belles WI

We had our first trip out since coming back to real meetings – a fascinating tour of Richmond Georgian Theatre.

Clare Allen, Chief executive, led our tour and was excellent at explaining the historical significance of Richmond's

theatre. It dates from 1788, built by actor-manager Samuel Butler. Butler owned and ran a chain of similar theatres – and Richmond is the only one to survive. It has had periods of time as an auction house, a wine merchants and grain store. However, it was refurbished in 1963, a small museum added in in 1996, with a £1.6m upgrade completed in 2002. Clare explained how lockdowns had given the time to complete the seating refurbishment. Wooden benches, dating from fifty years ago, are now replaced with cushioned seating. She explained how this upgrade had meant a reduction in capacity – although the seats lost were those with very restricted views.

She also explained that the theatre was run by a small group and depended heavily on over 100 volunteers – she may have been hinting that more volunteers would be very welcome.

A brief forage into the nearest hostelry (the recently refurbished Fleece) ended a very pleasant evening.

The next meeting is in the Village Hall on Tuesday 9th November where we will be making Christmas decorations from a variety of textiles.



"SPONSOR A SLATE"

- 1. The complete church roof was re-tiled in 1944 with concrete tiles made using local Redcar beach sand. These tiles generally last around 50 years, and the tiles above the two aisles were replaced in 1999. The nave and chancel tiles have lasted longer, but have now reached the end of their life, and become porous with sand being washed out by heavy rain that regularly blocks the guttering system. Over the last year we have had to replace 140 tiles that were badly disintegrated. The tiles now require early replacement, and it is planned to use Welsh slates that will last considerably longer. At the same time, the asphalt valley gutters, which have been repaired many times, will be replaced with more robust zinc sheeting.
- We ran a competition in July/August to select a contractor to carry out the works, and the winning bid came in at just under £67,000. Whilst some of that sum will come from church reserves, we are now embarking on a fundraising programme and 15 applications are in the pipeline with major grant funders. However, grant donors always like to see local fundraising from within the community for projects like these. We are therefore launching a "sponsor a slate" campaign with a suggested figure of £10, but any size of donation would be greatly appreciated. In these days of contactless payment, the easiest way to make a donation is by BACS and the church account details are:
