Well that's June almost done. Bye June, you gave us some nice weather, better than May. I didn't like May. Rotten weather, footfall plummeting and a loss of almost £300 for the month (and it wasn't even rent month). Where'd everyone go? Oh yeah, away to see rellies or friends they hadn't seen for eons, or just off to the pub.

I've been typing furiously and produced a list of the wines we can get from York Wines, who we partnered with some time last year, deep Covid. Some of those on the list we have in stock anyway, but we only have so much room so the aim of this project (she said grandly) is to let you know what you could get if you wanted. And there are so many, many more wines that they stock that if you have a fave plonk or bubbly, just ask and I can see if we can get it and how much for. But in the meantime, my list lets you know the price of a single bottle or a case of 6 of a small but popular selection (and if you went for the case, you'd get 10% off). Pick up a list from the shop.

We order on a Tuesday and bottles of fabness arrive on the Thursday. Can't get to the shop? Order a case or more and we'll work out a delivery time to suit you (an exercise in adapting to your needs!) If you'd like the wine list emailed to you, send me a mail on the above address and I'll whiz one over to you. Or noodle one over, depending on my mood.

This month I have been mainly eating fish. So much omega 3 that I am now a genus. Mackenzie's Smokehouse peppered mackerel fillets (\pounds 2.92), their smoked salmon (\pounds 5.00), fish pies from Carricks (defrost before cooking), fish cakes (salmon & broccoli or haddock and spring onion – \pounds 1.22 each), Ramus raw peeled tiger prawns (\pounds 4.50 for 200g), Princes red salmon (\pounds 4.75), Princes sardines in tomato sauce or sunflower oil (\pounds 1.25) and good old tuna.

Do you leap out of bed with the dawn chorus in the mornings but then half an hour later can't think of anything to do. Or is it a case of dragging yourself out from under the cosy covers and stumbling bleary eyed to the kettle? Either way, have a think whether you could help us out one morning a week. Or more if you like it, obvs. 7am to 9am, it's a cinch when you get used to it, and full training is given (though we've had to dispense with the whip since I broke it). No experience necessary and you'll be joining a friendly team all keen on keeping our community shop going.

Coming soon is our summer raffle. For £1 a ticket be in with the chance of winning a hamper I'll put together full of goodies from the shop. All profits go to support the shop. Nagging starts when the hamper is done, and the draw will be at the end of August.

If you come into the shop on a Saturday and a tall teenager meets you at the door armed with the sanitiser, don't be alarmed. This is Finn. Finn is working in the shop as part of his Duke of Edinburgh Bronze Award Scheme, so good for him. Being young, Finn has picked things up really quickly and remembers it. We went off Finn just as quickly. Two things to keep in mind – (1) Finn is not mine. He talks to me more in two hours than mine does in two weeks. (2) We are not being overly protective when we do certain aspects of the job, its because he is not allowed by law to do them.

A quicky for dog owners – please do not leave dog waste in the shop bins. This is the one outside the entrance in the garden, and the one opposite the Memorial Hall door. There are plenty of bins in the village that are emptied by the Council, ours aren't. We do it.

Anyone who knew Ken Etherington will be sad to hear he's now had to go into a care home. I knew Ken from his years helping in the shop, which was just one of the many things he did to help the village. He was Chairman of just about every Committee going at some point, though maybe not the Craft Club. Think he gave that one a miss, although he probably would've done if he was asked, because he's helpful like that. We all miss him and know that he is probably fed up and missing us all. If you want to say hi via a card, just drop it into the shop and we'll pass it on.

Middleton Tyas Neighbourhood Watch



Our recent **PROTECT YOUR POOCH** campaign saw amazing support from a wide range of organisations and charities. The campaign, which was in response to many peoples' worries and concerns about pet theft, provides simple and effective advice on how to keep your dogs safe. You can watch the PROTECT YOUR POOCH webinar here: ourwatch.org.uk/webinars

Many people have received **suspicious SMS messages** claiming to be from a delivery company informing them that they had a package arriving shortly and to click on a link to track its delivery status. These messages are linked to a banking Trojan called "FluBot", disguising itself as a legitimate text from a delivery company when in fact its intention is to steal credentials and other personal data. You can protect yourself and encourage others you know to do the same by installing an antivirus solution that detects threats like Flubot on your mobile device and further protect yourself from FluBot and other mobile phishing attacks by:

• Not clicking on links in SMS messages - especially if a message is asking you to install software or apps on your devices.

• Questioning the message and not responding if in doubt - It is important that you are suspicious of phishing messages such as those that present an offer that seems too good to be true (e.g., how to win a new smartphone or inherit a large sum of money from an unknown family member).

• Not installing apps from anywhere but official app stores such as Google Play or the Apple App Store.

Awareness is the key for defending against phishing scams such as FluBot, and The National Fraud Investigation Bureau (NFIB) produces monthly threat assessments outlining trends in fraud reporting and emerging frauds that are anticipated over the coming weeks. Increases in reporting have been seen in a wide variety of attempted fraud.

To try to stay ahead of the fraudsters, some emerging issues to look out for are:

Festival/concert ticketing fraud.

• Holiday fraud - Fraudsters may look to take advantage of the demand for Covid 19 tests by purporting to offer reasonably priced tests to holidaymakers

• **Post-vaccine survey scams** - People are being contacted via email and/or text message after receiving the COVID19 vaccine to participate in a fraudulent post-vaccine survey with the promise of a prize or cash at the end.

• End of furlough schemes - It is highly likely that following the end of the furlough scheme fraudsters are likely to try and exploit the demand for short term loans.

• Advance fee fraud - This is when fraudsters target victims to make advance or upfront payments for goods, services and/or financial gains that do not materialise.

Why We Should Support Our Village Shop and Amenities?

Apart from the fact that the staff are amazing and will always do their best to help us the Daily Mail published an article on May 28 entitled '**Why a shop next door can help sell your home**'. Of course, you may not wish to sell your home but it is always helpful to have a few key facts if you are. Or even buying a new house.

According to Adam Stackhouse of the London based estate agents Winkworth, "As the work-life-commute balance is altered, and there is a genuine appeal in being part of a community and knowing your local retailers".

And having a business as a neighbour can add saleability - "Being close to good amenities or businesses will increase demand for a house and help to add to the speed at which the sale is progressed" says Simon Backhouse of Strutt & Parker's Canterbury Office.

Top of the shops to have as a neighbour is the traditional village-style store. "Businesses that appeal to potential buyers are hubs of the community such as gift shops, butchers and bakers and particularly florists" says Mr. Stackhouse. "The practicality of spending more time indoors has created a real interest in retail on our doorsteps as communities spend more time appreciating their immediate locale.the sense of community that a locally run enterprise brings to a village".

"In Barham, Kent the village store and post office is a community-run enterprise with all but one member of staff being volunteers". Almost like ours.

Another quote, this time from John Kelly (Glasgow) - "People want to school their children and live their life in their own community.

Aren't we lucky - we have a shop, Village Hall, school, pub, park, cricket club, football field and above all else a friendly and helpful community! Keep supporting.
