Play Park Equipment

The new play park equipment has now been installed and we hope will be well used and enjoyed. We also have grant funding for two new picnic tables which will be installed as soon as the weather improves and the ground is suitable for fixing. Please note the small gate, adjacent to the MUGA, is being taken out of use as it needs a repair to its closing mechanism.

Parish Precept 2023-24

The Parish Precept for the year from 1 April 2023 to 31 March 2024 has been increased for the coming year after several years of staying at the same rate. The increase is due to the rise in all our general running costs and to support the ongoing repair/maintenance of the Play Park.

Speeding and Parking

A few gentle reminders to everyone, if we may:

- the speed limit throughout the 'centre' of the village is **20mph** please respect this limit;
- the Vehicle Activated Speed (VAS) sign near West Close <u>is</u> working if it doesn't light up, it means you are not exceeding the speed limit at that point;

Also, that you should not park any vehicle:

- on double yellow lines around the village;
- as a courtesy, on white lines outside properties, making access difficult;
- on the pavement in such a way as to cause an obstruction for pedestrians and pushchair/wheelchair users.

News from Neighbourhood Watch

As we entered 2023, I am pleased to record that our Police Community Support Officer (PCSO) Elliot Brown reported that crime in the Middleton Tyas area fell from 9 to 1 from November to December 2022, even greater than the 33% fall in the wider Richmond area. I had been a little concerned that our November figures had contained a reference to 2 offences of 'violence against the person' and so I wrote to Elliot seeking clarification. His helpful response gives a useful insight into the nature of crime statistics, so I reproduce it here: 'The title of violence against the person is extremely broad and basically covers anything from assaults of any kind, stalking, harassment, malicious communications all the way up to murder. However, I am sure you would hear about the more serious levels of crimes through our press releases etc. I can confirm on this occasion however the violence against the person incident was domestic related therefore wouldn't impact on the wider community. Hope that helps.'

North Yorkshire Police have also provided advice on driving in winter conditions:

Advice

Here's some tips to keep you safe and sound on your winter journey:

Before you set off:

- · Check your tyre pressures are at the recommended level and that the tread depth is correct
- · Check your vehicle's lights are clean and in working order
- Check your wiper system is working effectively and that your washer bottles are full and contain a suitable additive to prevent freezing
- · Make sure that all your windows and mirrors are completely clear of ice and condensation
- · Make sure you have a can of de-icer and a scraper in your vehicle
- For longer journeys, consider taking a flask of a hot drink, a blanket and a shovel
- Download the What3Words app this can help breakdown or emergency services reach you quickly, wherever you might be.

On your way:

- · When driving, travel slowly and at a safe distance from the vehicle in front
- · Avoid harsh braking or steering
- · Always use dipped headlights when visibility is poor
- · Travel on main roads that have been treated with salt, rather than untreated minor roads
- Keep an eye out for black ice remember this happens on dry roads when early morning dew falls on cold road surfaces and freezes on impact.
- · And remember, watch your speed. It's much better to arrive late than not at all.

Police have also received a number of reports since Christmas about fraud where a fraudster contacts victims by telephone claiming a fraud has been detected and sometimes asks the victim to phone the number on the back of their bank card. The fraudster then stays on the line to deal with the victim's follow up call and subsequently asks the victim to transfer money. We are reminded that the police will NEVER ask anyone to withdraw money for any reason.






