And lo, its happened again. The year has passed with the speed of a menopausal woman trying to get to the loo in time and Christmas is reaching its greedy fingers into our bank accounts to try and wring every penny out of us, after it's done the same with our common sense.

It's been a busy but strange week, with some new people coming in, some who've struck me as a little bit, well, regal. Effortless elegance, old money kind of thing. One chap had been looking out his window a bit and came in for some bread, a bottle of wine, pine logs and directions to a house underneath a mountain. Makes a change from Middleton Lodge. I chose a nice prosecco for some Christmas bubbles, a freshly baked demi-baguette but the nearest high bit of land I could think of was Roseberry Topping and we only had a bag of kindling and some firelighters, yet he went away happy. More helpful than Tesco, he said regally, calling me Paige. Then an older lady needing something other than an apple that might be good for a friend ('friend' was said a little strangely though, as if it pained her). While she was browsing the boxes of chocolates that are an ideal gift for a Secret Santa or an obvious neighbour, two of our regular customers came in, Tweedledum and Tweedledee. Both are height challenged and the lady, peering over a box of After Eight Selection, visibly blanched. Eventually she decided on a box of Lindor in a pleasingly shiny, red box.

After tying up what looked oddly like a reindeer to our dog hook, but which she insisted was a great dane cross wearing a fun headband (sit Sven, sit), a younger lady came in looking for something frozen. I showed her our range of cold remedies (Lemsip pills and drinks, Sudafed, Vaporub, Vicks inhaler stick, various Benylin cough meds, Covonia, Strepsils, Jakemans and Halls throat sweets) while wondering what made her house a palace. Did she know mine is generally a tip and she was making a point? Was she merely showing off or being ironic? But an almost negligible flare of her eyes gave away that she hadn't meant to say palace so I let her off and showed her the softer, Kleenex balm tissues that would be kinder on her delicate little nosey.

For a piece in the region of 2.5 kilos it comes out at about £27-£30 to buy. And treat your family or guests to freshly baked potato rolls, demi baguettes or croissants, which you can buy from us. Ask us too what Taylors family sized pork pies, pigs in blankies and similar stuff you can order.

The quiz at the Shoulder on the 19<sup>th</sup> raised a brilliant £412, to be split between Swaledale Mountain Rescue and North Yorkshire Air Ambulance. A big thank you to all who came along and to James and Hana for hosting. There is no quiz in December but keep an eye out for posters and posts about January's quiz, date yet to be decided. We will be running that to raise funds for the Memorial Hall, which has just had to pay out rather a large sum of money to replace their aged boiler.

After many months of the flag flying at full mast, we sadly said goodbye to two long term residents of the village (and just outside), Mary Frost and Elizabeth Davies, both wonderful and lovely ladies. Mary was 98 and Liz just days away from celebrating her 90th and both had been supporters of the shop since it opened. Liz had ordered from the shop every week for so long that I spoke 'Liz' (I can also speak Barbara and Phyllis and a spattering of Jim, because he does like to surprise us occasionally. We're also currently learning Dean and Paul, as Dean likes red onion on his tuna, not cucumber (have you got that, *onion*) and Paul is ham, lettuce, cucumber, yellow pepper, mushroom and mayo)). I used to love delivering to Liz on the odd occasion that I had forgotten to send a part of her order (okay, maybe more than the odd occasion, given my memory) as you really did feel you were out in the country, peace and quiet, birds singing kind of thing.

# **WHICH? Scams to Watch Out For**

There seem to be a lot of phone scams to watch out for at the moment – Winter Fuel Payments, Black Friday Offers, Domestic Appliance Warranties, etc. You can be warned about some of the current scams online at the *Which*? Scam Alert service at <u>info@mail.which.co.uk</u>.

Please do not give your personal or bank details to anyone who contacts you 'out of the blue' – reputable organisations will never ask for such information over the phone. If in doubt, check with a family member or friend, and/or contact your own bank (the number is on your bank/credit card) or contact the **Fraud Line on 159**.

**159** is the memorable, secure number that connects you directly to your bank if you think you're being scammed. 159 works in the same way as 101 for the police or 111 for the NHS. It's the number you can trust to get you through to your bank, every time. **159 will never call you**.


#### **Local Crime Information**


Our local PCSO Elliot Brown reports that in October 2024 there was a total of 31 recorded crimes in the wider Richmond rural area including 10 (which in turn included 3 drug offences) in the Middleton Tyas Ward covering Scotch Corner and Moulton as well as Middleton Tyas.

#### A Scam warning from a local resident

An elderly resident of Middleton Tyas has alerted us to a particularly upsetting and disturbing scam which could cause a great deal of anxiety to older recipients in particular. The scam involves the receipt of a very nasty unsolicited email that is full of crude sexual allegations, and which claims to know what inappropriate sexual activity the recipient has been engaged in. It threatens to publicly expose the recipient unless the sender receives a payment to keep quiet. Detailed analysis suggests that this email may have originated in America and may be primarily directed at male recipients but the whole thing is very nasty and potentially very upsetting.


