### **Co-option to the Parish Council**

We are very pleased to announce that we have **two new Parish Councillors**, bringing our number up to five. This will make running the day-to-day business, and having quorate meetings, much easier as the burden on three Councillors has been quite heavy over the past year. Our new Councillors will also bring different areas of expertise and energy to the ongoing work of the Council and we will welcome Cllr Gerard Seal and Cllr Sören Nilsson at our March meeting. The Council is allowed up to seven members, so if anyone else is considering joining the team, please get in touch with the Clerk or any Councillor for further information. It would be nice to have another lady or a young representative on the team!

### New Litter / Dog Waste Bins

We have recently had two large Litter Bins installed: a new one on Smithgutter Lane – a regular dog walk for many; and one on Cow Lane (to replace the small Dog Waste Bin) at NYC's request as the small one was frequently full to overflowing and they decided not to continue emptying it. All Litter Bins in the village are suitable for both litter and dog waste (*apart from the open-topped waste bin at the Village Shop*) and are emptied regularly by either NYC or our Village Handyman.

### Reporting matters for repair or of concern to North Yorkshire Council

The dedicated 'portal' which used to be available to the Parish Clerk to report matters for repair or of concern to NYCC was closed down at the end of December 2024 and the Clerk now only has the same access to NYC services as the general public.

If you are need any help doing this, the Clerk is always happy to offer support.

### **Local Crime Information**

Our local PCSO Elliot Brown reports that in December 2024 there was a total of 27 recorded crimes in the wider Richmond rural area including 3 in the Middleton Tyas Ward which covers Scotch Corner and Moulton as well as Middleton Tyas. These 3 local offences in turn included 1 assault, 1 theft and 1 criminal damage.

### Parking near Middleton Tyas Shop

It has been drawn to my attention that a number of vehicles have been parked on the double yellow lines near Middleton Tyas Village Shop, presumably when their owners have been shopping. Not only is parking on double yellow lines illegal at any time, but the Highway Code also says that parking within 10 metres of a junction is wrong. The particular setting of the yellow lines near the Village Shop makes the location especially dangerous, particularly at this time of year when the Sun is low in the sky and oncoming drivers may find it very difficult to see any parked vehicle. Please respect the law and park legally and safely away from the yellow lines.

### North Yorkshire Police Information

Updates

On Friday 13<sup>th</sup> December with a proactive vehicle stop where officers seized offensive weapons and several suspected firearms during the stop.

Following this, a warrant was executed at a nearby address, resulting in the recovery of £12,000 in cash, a significant quantity of suspected Class A controlled drugs, and an additional firearm.

Thanks to the collaborative efforts of a number of our teams, the operation culminated in one individual being charged with possession with intent to supply Class A drugs, alongside multiple other offences.

The 38-year-old man from Richmondshire appeared in court, where he was remanded into custody until his next court appearance in the New Year. Updates

On the afternoon of Monday 2nd December 2024 in an area close to Easby Abbey, Richmond, a vigilant member of the public spotted a Silver transit van and recognised it as being involved in Night Hawking (Illegal Metal detecting). The same vehicle had been seen days before parked in the area but was unfortunately missed by officers.

At 13:30 hrs officers from Rural Task Force and response attended the area and located the male found in the act of sweeping a field with a metal detector. It was quickly established that this male had no permission to be on this land at which point he was relieved of all of his expensive metal detecting gear. He will be interviewed in due course for offences of Going equipped to steal, theft and other relevant offences.

Please report any sightings of illicit metal detecting and Night Hawking immediately to police.



Landteam Farms would like to report the diversion of the Public Bridleway No. 20.46/24 at Brook House Farm, East of Middleton Tyas under the Diversion Order 2021. A plan of the new route is shown. The new route has been built to *include both a hard surface* (designed to be a suitable surface for both cyclists and walkers) and a soft surface (designed to be a canter strip for horse riders). All users of the bridleway are asked to kindly please follow the new route, which now runs to the east of the Brook House Farm Yard and links Cow Lane with Five Hills Lane.

For those adolescents in Kenya's urban townships; vulnerable to sexual exploitation, physical abuse and poverty, we assist them develop academic, vocational and critical life skills. In the remote villages of Karare; Marsabit County, we work with pastoralist communities where young girls are vulnerable to harmful traditional and cultural practices of child marriage and female genital mutilation.

Focusing on enhancing life skills and teaching vocational skills; women are able to earn money to care for their families, support access to education for their daughters and strengthen their ability to make decisions. Last time I went I took a suitcase full of underwear for the young girls, I'll probably do the same this time and have

also been asked to take children's knitted hats. Luckily BA allow extra baggage for this charity trip. So if anyone would like to knit and donate hats I would be very grateful.
